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From the Church Wardens



As most of you will know, at the end of May during the night someone broke into our church in Frant by smashing a window. A few days later Holy Trinity church in Eridge suffered a similar break in when the new stained glass window (right) dedicated last year to the memory of the former Marquis and Marchioness of Abergavenny was smashed.

In Frant church the collecting box by the main door was wrenched off causing considerable damage to the wooden pew to which it was attached. The lock on the vestry door was also prised off, again damaging the door and smashing the lock. Everyone who came into the church on that morning said the same thing, 'Who could do such a thing?' But as the Police woman said, sadly this kind of crime is now common place. However, traumatic as it was, this incident did show me how kind, helpful and considerate most people are.

First, the lady who discovered the break in, spent 45 minutes on the 'phone waiting in a queue of callers to report the incident to the police. The police woman who attended was friendly, sensitive and thorough. She spent a long time asking questions noting evidence and taking photographs, on the chance that it could be linked to someone detained at a later date for a similar crime. The locksmith, who was having a very busy day, found time to come and do whatever repairs he could. By late afternoon, having tried unsuccessfully to find someone to board up the window, I was standing in the vestry wondering what to do and saying a quick prayer, when a young couple came into the church. The young man said "I hear you have a problem with a window". I showed him the problem and he said "I'll do that for you, it'll take me about half an hour".

When I asked him how he'd like paying he said "O no, I don't want paying". As if that wasn't enough, his wife said that while he was doing the window, would I like her to start picking up the books and clearing up the mess. I came back after an hour to find that not only was the window neatly boarded but everything was clean, tidy and where it should be.

I just said "Thank You Lord, that most people are so good". These are just a few acts of everyday kindness and consideration. Our Queen said some very wise words of hope on this subject in a Christmas broadcast several years ago. She said:

"A big stone can cause waves, but even the smallest pebble changes the whole pattern of the water. Our daily actions are like those ripples, each one makes a difference, even the smallest. It does matter therefore what each individual does each day. Kindness, sympathy, consideration and courteous behaviour are infectious, and the combined effect can be enormous. If enough grains of sand are dropped into one side of a pair of scales, they will in the end, tip it against a lump of lead. We may feel powerless alone, but the joint efforts of individuals can defeat the evils of our time. Together they can create a stable, free and considerate society".

In our Parish of Frant and Eridge, I know that we do see this happening, let's make sure it happens even more and keeps happening. One last thought, we shouldn't forget the person(s) whose actions caused us so much trouble and anxiety. I think it must makes us all sad that it may be a young person who has made some terrible choices in a short life and has not been shown the right path. So we should also hope and pray for that person(s) that he/she will one day, somehow be shown a better way.

### What's in a name?

This is the parish of Frant with Eridge. "Frant" means "place of the fern", but what is the origin of the place name "Eridge"? It is I think now commonly accepted that it is derived from two Old English words: "erne" meaning "eagle" and "hrycg" meaning "ridge" - in other words "the ridge of the eagles".

Seven or eight years ago a white-tailed eagle was spotted in Sussex, the first eagle seen in the county for 50 years. But that was near Pulborough. It must be a very long time since one was seen in Eridge. Crows are seen in Crowborough, and probably hawks in Hawkhurst, but no longer eagles in Eridge.

What, however, about the other part of the name? Where is the ridge - in the dictionary defined as a "long narrow hilltop"? Holy Trinity Church in Eridge certainly stands on high ground between Tunbridge Wells and Crowborough but nothing that fits the dictionary definition of a ridge.

In fact the Old English word "hrycg" also means "back of a man or beast". This fits better with the topography of Eridge: not a long narrow ridge, but a broad stretch of high ground. And while reflecting on names....

"Unless a man understands the Weald, he cannot write about the beginnings of England." The High Weald - an area of outstanding beauty - has its own website (www.highweald.org), from which that quotation by Hilaire Belloc was taken. Belloc grew up in what is now West Sussex. His passion for our county appeared in several of his works, including "The Four Men: a Farrago", which describes a long walk across Sussex from Robertsbridge to Harting.

What however is the origin of the name "Weald"? It is another old English word, meaning "forest". For many centuries the High Weald was indeed an immense and virtually impenetrable forest spreading across Kent, Sussex and Surrey known as "Andredsweald", a name deriving from "Anderitum", a Saxon shore fort near Pevensey during the time of the Roman occupation of Britain. According to the Anglo Saxon Chronicle, this forest stretched westwards from Pevensey for some 120 miles, and was some thirty miles broad. Within it were a small number of clearings: in the Domesday Book seven are mentioned, among them Ifield, Sheffield, Hartfield, Maresfield and Rotherfield.

Although the clearings have become ever greater, it is still possible to see around us the remains of this great forest.

### **Parish Council**

» The 2018 Annual Assembly In May we held our Annual Assembly in the Memorial Hall. This is an annual event where the Parish Council talks about what it has been up to in the last year, and about the year ahead.

The Chairman, William Rutherford, opened the meeting by publicly thank three councillors who stood down this year, Carmel Kinley, David Wright and Sue Hutchings. He said, "They all brought knowledge, experience and enthusiasm to the council and I am very grateful for all their help and support". He also welcomed our two new councillors, Sue Wallis and Debbie Park, who are already throwing themselves into the work of the parish council. William also thanked our clerk, Rosie, "Her hard work since she joined eighteen months ago is transforming the professionalism with which the parish council carries out its activities.".

The Chairman talked about how the Parish Council manages its assets and explained that it has started a rolling programme of repairing the Fingerposts (the white wooden signs you will see around the area), with three being refurbished in 2017 and another two planned in 2018. The parish is also having the Eridge sign repaired, and it should be re-erected soon. He reported that the Halls in Bells Yew Green had been extensively refurbished by BCM an engineering company that has been based at Frant Station for several months. BCM did the work for free as a contribution to the community and the whole meeting wanted to pass of their thanks to BCM for their generous support.

The Annual Assembly also hear a presentation from the environmentalist who had been employed to recommend an environmentally friendly management scheme for the Green in Frant. The acid grassland that constitutes most of the village green is a comparatively rare habitat in East Sussex now, and we are very lucky

that such a large area has remained undisturbed. The Parish Council and the Friends of the Green are excited about this project, but it will be carefully monitored over the next few months to ensure that is develops as expected and that the community remains supportive. The plan met with universal support from the meeting.

### A Village Green for Eridge

The other subject covered at the Annual Assembly was an exciting proposal for Eridge. The Parish Council have been exploring the possibility of creating a small "centenary" village green area on a piece of farmland at the back of Eridge Church and adjacent to Warren Farm Lane,

The owners of the land, the daughters of the late Marquess, John Abergavenny, have reacted positively to the suggestion, and both the Parish Council and the owners of the land are keen for the area to be a recreational space for the village and also to mark the 100th anniversary

of the end of World War 1 and to remember those who lost their lives in WW1 and WW11 including Rupert Nevill who died in 1918.

The Parish Council would like to hear from local residents - their thoughts and ideas for the green. -Cllr William Rutherford

#### **Frant Open Spaces**

I would like to start by apologising for the messy and muddled start to the cutting year on Frant Green. It has been enormously hard to get the work carried out, as we would like, when we would like in this first few months. There are still, as I write this, various issues that need correcting around footpaths and safety issues on corners for carvision. Hopefully by the time you are reading things will be fully resolved and The Green and the amenity areas will be properly cut as we hope it will be for the future.

The longer areas are developing into a rich and varied habitat. Those areas will need managing to suit each habitat in the future, so the work is still developing. The good news is that the ecologist can confirm we have 1.5 hectares of rare acid high weald grassland. There are only 200 hectares of this in Sussex as a whole. This habitat has been identified as being among the most threatened and requiring conservation under the UK Biodiversity Action Plan. There has also been a sighting of a wild orchid on The Green.

The Friends group carried out a car trespass and erosion audit earlier this spring that we took to the Parish Council. We were delighted that they took this very seriously and have agreed to get professional traffic management companies to look at this problem Parish wide and offer solutions to mitigate car and lorry damage in the future.

The Friends committee are planning some improvements of sustainable management around The Victoria and Albert Wells. You may already notice an improvement. If not keep an eye out. -Jan Steadman

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

On Sunday May 10th on the field behind the school usually reserved for bonfires, 16 local men fought back the hands of time and played the first football match there for over 10 years. What was different about this game against a very sporting Langton Green team, was that the players from both sides were all over the age of 40. It mattered not that Frant F.C. gallantly lost 6-0 because this score line didn't reflect the competitiveness of the game itself. What mattered was that the game happened at all after only one solitary person turned up to the

initial launch meeting back in February, and large numbers of stubborn moles have looked to terrorise the immaculate playing surface. However, a handful of undeterred local individuals, bonded by a late night promise in the pub have worked hard on renovating the pitch to a playable standard after years of disuse. They sourced kit, press-ganged players, organised training sessions and eventually saw the promise through to fruition.

A good local crowd swelled by youngsters, families and a dog, saw the veterans of Frant parish put their aching bodies on the line, hitting the oppositions post twice in a thrilling 2nd half siege on the Langton goal. Our next home match is on Sunday 10th June at 10am against a Rotherfield team who look good on paper but can be beaten on grass. The aim is to play only 4 friendly games per year (Two matches in Spring, two in Autumn) against hand-picked opposition.

### **Parish Past**

It will come as a surprise to many that the first recorded headmaster of Frant School proved to be a rogue and a thief. Adam Jacob was not only headmaster, but churchwarden and overseer of the poor, and in 1826 at an open parish meeting a leading resident, General Beatson, accused Jacob of defrauding the poor on a grand scale. The relief system then was wide open to abuse as, in an age without paper bags, the poor were often paid in handfuls of grubby flour which they then needed somehow to exchange for other essentials. Beatson also accused Jacob of being in league with the flour suppliers thus providing additional rakeoffs for both, and of spending poor relief on himself. Since a bill exists from 1815 showing Jacob and another overseer, Joseph Newington, spending no less than £11.11p of poor money on a single dinner, lodging and drinks for themselves, Beatson had a case. A weekly wage for an unskilled labourer then would have been roughly 5 or 6 shillings a week (about 35p in modern money but prices were very different). Jacob furiously refuted the allegations, backed by Daniel Rowlands the Eridge agent, who had appointed him and disliked



having his judgement questioned. A violent row followed and the meeting broke up in general disorder but Beatson was not easily defeated and insisted on his right as a ratepayer to examine the relief accounts. After studying these he published a pamphlet at his own expense detailing discrepancies amounting to  $\pounds$ 804 over five years, when the average annual parish expenditure was £1168 - a sum which incidentally shows the scale of rural poverty at the time. Beatson also denounced the whole system of paying the poor in flour and the practice does seem to have ended in Frant shortly afterwards. Jacob apparently made no public denial and soon resigned as churchwarden and, so far as can be established, overseer of the poor. He remained headmaster of the school however, about which more next time. -Pat Wright


