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
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From the Rectory

The reason it was my favourite was, I think, for a couple of reasons; firstly, because Autumn was when I have my birthday and I had the impression that it must be my favourite because of that, but more than that, autumn for me always confirmed for me a sense of home and belonging.

I'd spend my summer days out of the house from dawn till dusk, but as the nights drew in I would recede to the comfort, warmth and security of the home. There was something novel about being snuggled up on the sofa after seemingly having hardly been there for months. We loved our fire at this time of year and my family would spend a great deal of time warming our backs to the fire!

What is a home? It's so much more than where you live, we've lived in 4 houses in 7 years (I hope not to keep to that regularity ever again!) Home also isn't really about where you live or

the number of beautiful things you have in your house, some of my happiest times have been some of the simplest times.

Finding home, I think, is an inbuilt longing for all of us, and it's especially painful if we lose that sense of home, which too often can happen. Nothing lasts forever, that sense of home I had as a child has to many extents gone.

But what if there was a home for us that never came to an end?

Jesus talks of heaven like a home. That place of unending warmth, security and family with each other and God. Isn't that what we long for?

My prayer is that our earthly homes might reflect that heavenly home, giving a glimpse of the heavenly home God makes for us. But more than that, I pray that our churches can be a home for all to know that sense of family, security and life. We have been reflecting these last few weeks at church on how the Bible helps us to know what community and church can be like, and in many ways at its best, church is like a home, which reflects a heavenly home of peace, light, life and family with God.

However you cope with the drawing in of the nights, as we move into winter, I pray that you might know a deepening sense of home in your heart. -Brendan

Since the last edition, we have had one baptism, one wedding and one funeral.


In August Archie Paton was baptised by the Reverend Stella Halmshaw. Archie wasn't impressed, but his sister Rosie really enjoyed it.

If there was anything happening in the village Joan was there, and by being there she played her part in making Frant a healthy and thriving community.

In September, Chloe Blake, who lived for several years in the village, married Nathan Massini. We wish Chloe and Nathan every blessing in their life together.

In August, our Youth Worker, Ed, with the assistance of Emma Torr, took 12 young people to a Christian youth camp, 'Soul Survivor' in Peterborough. They had a wonderful, exciting and exhausing time, having the opportunity to hear excellent speakers, meeting other young Christians and partying. Ed and Emma survived!

September began with the very formal and traditional service of licensing, conducted by the Bishop of Lewes,



for our new Rector, Brendan Martin (pictured above with his family). Having been eighteen months without a Rector it was a great relief and an occasion of great celebration.

On 22nd September our Bishop, Richard Jackson, conducted what will probably be his last services with us in Frant and Eridge, as he is leaving to become Bishop of Hereford in the new year. He has been incredibly helpful and supportive to us over the past eighteen months, we're sad to see him go and wish him every blessing in his new post.

At the end of September our youth ministry moved forward into a new venture when Youth Worker, Ed, who has been training for many months as a 'Forest School' leader, took 9 children whose ages ranged between 3 years and 12 years, into a wooded area of the Rectory paddock for their first session of 'Forest School', where over the next six weeks they'll experience many and

various aspects of outdoor living. I'm pleased to say that at the end of the session, he returned 9 children to their parents, all rather grubby and with only two very minor injuries!

The long awaited day finally came on 6th October when Brendan conducted his first service as our new Rector. There were just over 100 people in church to welcome him. The fact that it was Harvest Festival made it even more special. With the gifts brought by the school children to their service, and gifts brought on Sunday morning, we were able to give a good amount of food to the Diocese of Chichester Family Support Work Group and the West Kent Women's Refuge.

Parish past

A hundred or more years ago the parish was almost semi-industrial as well as agricultural. In the early 19th century Frant was rather surprisingly described as a "thriving town" and remained a bustling place into the mid 20th century. There were many trades including tilers, millers, bakers and brewers, many employing others and training apprentices. There were even watercarriers - no mains water until 1935! Sixty plus domestic staff were employed around Frant and more in Bells Yew Green and Eridge. Dances, sing-songs and Sunday gatherings on the Green were normal, the latter often turning into romances. In and around Bells Yew Green Leafwood Brewery employed around 50 workers until it shut in 1940, there was also a timber mill (employing 8-10), Bartley Mill rather unexpectedly in certain seasons employing up to 50 including clerks, and Camden Estate Yard where around 25 men worked in a



variety of trades. The station & signal box too, employed 4-5.

At Eridge the estate yard was similar and also possessed a temperamental sawmill driven by steam, selling building timber as well as supplying the estate, which also meant a team of foresters. At one time there was even a gasworks. In Frant itself we find a wheelwright, a blacksmith who also produced cast ironwork and manufactured tools, a saddler (above), a coffin-maker, a cobbler who made as well as mended shoes, a slaughterhouse and a working water tower. Historically, there is also mention of lathe-turners, a fletcher (arrow maker), a rope winder, narrow weavers, a trug maker and of course countless iron workers. In addition, right across the parish there would have been around 100 or so agricultural workers - hops in particular (a speciality of Hamsell Wood, Eridge) were seasonally labour intensive involving stringing, picking, drying, pressing into specially made hop-pocket sacks, carting. And all of the above made good trade for the pubs! -Pat Wright

Henry Smith was born in Wandsworth in 1548, he was a City merchant and alderman and he left a detailed will establishing various charitable trusts. One such trust was to the poor of various parishes in the South East; Frant being one of these. The trust continues to this day due to Henry's foresight in buying some marshy

land just outside the City of London in a little place called Kensington! Andy McDonald-Brown explained that the Parish Council manages the bequest and this is distributed to various worthy causes within the Parish.

After tea and cake we then got down to the serious business of the AGM. Brian Gill our Chairman welcomed members and also welcomed our new Administrator Cheria Ledward who had taken over from Gill Barnes. David Addev

Long term Frant resident, David Addey recently passed away. He was very much loved in the community. A long term friend, wrote the following tribute:

"I don't think that it is very often that you can remember the first and last time you met a person. But, in David's case, I can.

Anne and I moved to Frant on the 20th September 1975, from the Cotswolds, but Anne was from Canada and I was from South London. We didn't know anyone in the area. We were huddled around the solitary damp log burning in the fireplace, there was no oil for the central heating, and we had virtually no furniture. There was a knock knock at the front door (the bell didn't work) and there was a charming lady with the Parish Magazine. It was Shirley Addey getting a look at the new, young folk who had bought their friends, the Slattery's house. The Slatterys had moved to Chiddingly and invited us to a party in mid November.

It was a Saturday and we were dithering about whether to go or not. Shirley phoned and insisted that they gave us a lift and so they picked us up, that was fortunate as it was a party for us specifically, to introduce us into Frant society. That was when I first met David, he was the dedicated driver, well he would have been if anybody cared then.

He was driving a nice new car, the one he was still using, just a few weeks ago, which brings me onto the last time that I saw David. This was on 15th June this year, the day of Frant Open Gardens. He drove into our drive in his vintage car. The others in their Mercedes, BMWs, Audis, all looked terrified. He shunted back and forwards I don't think he bashed anyone. He only wanted to see us and our garden, which he did, then had a cup of tea and a piece of cake followed by a snooze in our conservatory. I did not watch him depart, it probably resembled dodgems!

In David's obituary, in *The Telegraph* recently, it mentions his career as an architect and then as an artist. Also mentioned were his hobbies and sporting achievements. But what was not mentioned was his work on the memorial hall management committee, from January 1971 to July 1974 as chairman, I see from the minutes of 24th April 1974 that the committee extended their thanks to David for "

being such a marvellous chairman". During his tenure David found some interesting and valuable artworks under the hall stage. These turned out to be by the Tailor of Frant, George Smart. They were subsequently hung in the hall until their theft in 2015.

Subsequently David served as a trustee of the hall from the 7th July 2004 (although he missed his first meeting), until, I think 2017. David and I served on that committee, together, for about 11 years and it was fun. I remember at one meeting, a discussion about the rental fees, some users were complaining about an increase. David seemed to be dozing, then he looked up and said he can been calculating and the increase was less than the cost of a cup of coffee. We laughed, they didn't.

I also remember a village meeting, a few years ago, about new housing in the parish.

The planners, from Wealden, were all there telling the assembled mob that so many houses had to be built In the 'core area ' of the village. David pointed out that the only vacant land in the core was our green. The planners were thrown into total confusion when David asked if they planned to build there.

We often had a glass, or two of wine after meetings to mull over events and life. But not mulled wine, which we

both hated. Then there were the art exhibitions in the garage, the cars had been moved, with the homemade wine. After a few glasses his paintings looked like Picassos!

David was also a founder member of Frant Forum, a group of local intellectuals, who met regularly to discuss topics of the day and put the world to rights. I am told that he gave these talks amongst others:

14/10/92: The Monarchy in Britain, will it last?

8/2/95: A question of taste. 13/12/95: Does money corrupt sport? 10/2/10: Waste disposal. 9/2/11: Etiquette.

As I am not an intellectual I was not a member and have no idea how his talks went, or the discussion afterwards. But I am sure that they were well received as David was an interesting and well informed chap.

And, of course, he was in the Telegraph many times. As he told Sue and was published in his obituary" I have been mentioned in Engagements, Letters, Art, Sport, and Crossword, just the obituary to go". How prescient of him.

We will all miss David, his humour, wisdom, but not the home made wine!"

Parish Survey

Change is a sure feature of our world and sometimes it feels that the pace of change is all too quick. Frant Parish Council is preparing to consult with parishioners on how to manage change in the Parish. In the New Year every parishioner will be invited to give their views on a range of topics that will help the Council make decisions on shaping the future of the parish. At present the local council has only limited powers over new housing development and the like. This means we are subject to the sometimes ambitions plans of Wealden District and East Sussex. We might optionally consider the adoption of a 'Neighbourhood Plan', which gives us more legislative powers over our future but is somewhat limited in scope, or a 'Parish Plan' which can be wide-reaching but packs less legal weight. The option we take will



be determined by your responses to our survey. In the meantime, talk to neighbours, your friends, your children and your grandchildren and prepare to give us your ideas on the future of Frant Parish and how you hope it will look and feel in 2035.

The Police and the Environment Agency are now involved. Anyone with any information should please contact the Police.

The Village Hall Committee is applying to Wealden Community Grants Programme for funding for further upgrades there. Let's hope this a story with a happy ending! Additional funds from the Christmas Craft Fair on Saturday, 16th November should certainly bolster the funds too.

Frant Memorial Hall

On 12th May 1921 the Village received "a Deed of Gift by the Most Hon, the Marquis of Camden of the site of the War Memorial Hall as a memorial to Parishioners of Frant who served in the Great War 1914-1918"

There must be records of the building of the Hall and of its usage in those early days. That this happened just three years after the end of the War, and in memory of those who served, must have made it a very special place in the hearts of the people living in the village.

Fast-forwarding to Sunday 11th November last year, one hundred years on from the end of the First World War, it was fitting that the Hall became host to a special commemoration of Remembrance Day with input from the Village, the Parish Council and the School.

The Memorial Hall website, thanks to some skilled background technology, is comprehensive and approachable, with the aim of making bookings a user friendly procedure.

The Hall is run as an independent charity by and on behalf of the villagers of Frant

Last year, following many successful

years as our chairman, Phillip Goodwin felt it was time to stand aside. Since then the Management Committee, though depleted has, through the energy and enthusiasm of its members and the goodwill of supporters and users, been successful in maintaining the firm foundation on which the future of the Hall depends.


