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From the Rectory



I have run out of description words to describe how very strange and unsettling this time is. Yet I hope to perhaps hold onto some of the positives even in tough times. When our community seems so isolated, I think we realised the value of community even more. When people are so socially distanced, I think we realised the value of human touch even more. When times are distressing, I think all of us want to look in hope of what is to come.

This Autumn we are doing church in a different way, having had services online, we are looking to safely meet together while observing all guidelines, both inside at church at Frant and Eridge, but also outside at our new "Festival Church" so-called because you may inevitably get a bit wet like at Festivals!

Our big theme at church the coming weeks will be "Become who you were made to be." These strange times I think can often come with some selfreflection on coming back to those big questions of life, who are we? is there a purpose?

At a time when relationships are somewhat limited and distanced, the Bible is clear that God has a purpose for our lives, and that purpose is found in the ways in which we relate to him, to each other and to creation.

At this socially distanced time we realise how important such relationships are, we might also realise we mess up these relationships all too often.

God is a God of relationships. He is not a distant God but comes to us by his son in Jesus, but is always with us by his Holy Spirit. We are never truly alone. He is working his purposes out to reestablish good relationships with each other and him.

My prayer is that through this we might look to God as our heavenly Father in hope, and to each other is care and unity.

When we are distant, we realise how important such closeness is. Join us in church as we try to encourage one another in our relationships with God, each other and the world.

News From The Pews

Having been informed on June 10th that the church could reopen, a thorough clean of the pews was carried out, and on Wednesday 24th June the church was opened for a few hours each Wednesday and Sunday. A number of pews, which were cleaned every week, were made available for personal prayer or for anyone who wished to just come in to sit and be quiet for a while.

'Social distancing services' began on 9th August with just 11 people attending. These were short spoken services of Morning Prayer with no singing and no sermon. A survey carried out showed that people were still reluctant to attend services in the church building, and would favour open air services, as a result it was decided to trial outside services and on 13th September a service in a marquee is to be held. If this is successful, services will be held outside for the foreseeable future. Meanwhile Brendan and Ed have continued to provide excellent online services each week. Youth worker, Ed, has also been very successful at keeping our youth ministry going online.

Like all churches, our finances have suffered badly in the past months. Not only are we missing what goes into the collection bag each week, plus of course wedding fees and sundry donations from visitors, but the loss of income from letting the Stables is considerable, with no indication at the time of writing as to when this can resume. However, the good news is that while the Stables building has been closed, the main room has been decorated thanks to Julie Pascoe. Also, the new church office is to go ahead in November, so hopefully we can take advantage of this time to clear the old office and set up in the new building.

The one thing that has been able to continue as normal is work in the churchyard, where our loyal team continues to keep our churchvard looking neat and well cared for. The dry weather has helped in that the grass hasn't grown so quickly and has needed less cutting. At one point during the summer something, believed to be a badger, was determinedly digging up the churchyard. A visit from Martin Newcombe, an authority on badgers, confirmed that the badger(s) had moved on to pastures new. In the autumn there will be a need for volunteers to help with

the tedious annual job of sweeping the leaves. Pat Wright would like to hear from anyone who can give an hour for a few weeks in October/November to help with this task. As you no doubt know, If dead leaves are left on the ground the grass underneath will die.

A glimmer of light and hope at the end of the tunnel came when we had a request for the bells to be rung at a wedding planned for August 2021. Sadly every wedding planned for 2020 had to be postponed, so who knows, 2021 may well be a bumper year for weddings. For all the couples who must have suffered such a huge disappointment this year, we hope and pray that it will be.

It has now been a year since Rev Brendan Martin was licenced as Rector of St Albans, and little did he know what a year it would be! As well as the somewhat daunting task of getting to know the church and the community, he has prepared and put together on line services, a very time consuming job, organised zoom PCC and committee

meetings, has been isolated in the Rectory for many months and has faced so many more problems in this strange year. He has done a wonderful job in a very difficult year. Thank you Rev Brendan!

Encounter - A BIG thank you All through the summer term, our youth workers, Ed and Julie, spent

quality "Zoom time" with many of our youth from the Encounter group. These sessions took place weekly in smaller groups of up to 6 meaning that Ed and Julie spent up to 6 evenings a week reaching out to those groups and engaging with them bringing fun, laughter and some thought provoking discussions into their sessions.

We all know how busy it has been with home schooling and adjusting to a different way of life until the schools opened again. For this reason, on behalf of all of the Encounter "Hubbers" -THANK YOU Ed and Julie for all you have done for us!

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
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Welcome back Deidre!

Parish Council News

Some good news to report you will all be pleased to hear. Our 'Vicar of Dibley' item has finally been resolved after nearly 2 years!

A light shines in Rushlye Close BYG. What's more it's not just any new light it is a solar powered one. Rumour has it we are one of the first Parish Councils to go solar on street lighting and let's hope it passes the test of time and winter! A lot cheaper to install and run than a mains electric light and of course much better for the environment.

We continue to meet under 'Zoom' conditions so the business of the day gets done but not always conducive for a full and wide ranging debate.

Planning takes up a lot of the time and of course we will, no doubt, be subjected to the new Government guidelines. The retirement village up by the golf course squeezed through planning and it does seem that Tunbridge Wells increasingly looks 'with envious eyes' at its East Sussex border as far as building developments are concerned.

The next few meetings, after the August recess, promise to be thought provoking and interesting. They range from deciding what type of bin to put on Frant Green-not as simple as you may think-they have to be user friendly to the bin collectors but also fox and crow proof. Eridge should be close to having its own Green to worry about and Frant's of course still has to be resolved. Even Bells Yew Greens Green (does that make sense?) needs some thought for next year. Our flower display was not up to its normal standard and I'm told this was due to the dry weather conditions.

We will also have to make some decisions about a final push, after about 2 years of local effort, to getting fibre broadband into the north of the Parish.

All this of course should be put into perspective. The Parish has, so far, escaped the worst of the pandemic and our shops and pubs remain open for business. We are very fortunate in many ways and we shouldn't lose sight of that fact especially in these extraordinarily challenging times.

From 4.30pm (for 5pm start) on Sunday afternoons the new Festival Church gatherings will be taking place in the Rectory paddock. This can be accessed through the small gate at the back of the Stables' car park in the corner.

There have been a few silver linings to these challenging times brought about by the pandemic and this is one of them. Rev Brendan Martin (pictured on the front cover) was already processing his ideas to introduce some outdoor worship into our community, given the space and beautiful surroundings we are fortunate enough to live in. With this in mind, our Youth Leader, Ed Pascoe, has trained and qualified as a forest school instructor to maximise the "outdoor opportunity" for the youth and kids groups.

Adults can relax and enjoy a talk, discussions, testimonies and music whilst the children go with their groups to enjoy woodland activities, bible stories, campfires and fun! The first of these services took place on Sunday 13th September to see how it would work. It was a real success and will be a work in progress to grow the event pending the ever-changing rules and Covid restrictions. At this point, we are limited to groups of 6 people who sit together and stay together throughout.

All those attending bring their own seats, flasks of tea/coffee etc (if required!) and there are logs to sit on for those feeling a bit more rustic!

Obviously, the current situation has forced us to think of new safe ways to engage with people, so we are just trying this new venture and we would really appreciate your ideas and feedback too. Of course, things can change, and we

will be constantly reviewing what we can do. Plans are afoot to provide cover and heat when the weather gets cooler so that we are not fair weather dependent.

Parish Past

Following on from place names last issue, I thought it might be interesting to look at the origin of some surnames which, rather surprisingly only became widespread because of the taxman. In the early Middle Ages first names were quite limited, and if you wanted to collect tax or tithes from John there were probably a dozen or more nearby ~ so John the Baker, John by the Green, John the Barber, Smith etc made identification and records possible. Basically, early surnames fall into a few broad categories, although of course many do not.

1. Occupation Carpenter, Miller, Fletcher (arrow-maker) Pierce (poacher, ie someone who pierces or wriggles illegally through a barrier/hedge), Smedley (a forge or ironworker), Burgess (townsman), Clayton (worker in clay for bricks), Packman (early commercial traveller), Turner (skilled worker with foot operated lathe).

2. Personal characteristics/nickname Brown (ruddy complexion), Black (swarthy), Bassett (French nickname for short), Strong, White (Old English for pale or blond), Crane (my son-in-law's name and all these hundreds of years later he is still notably long-legged like a crane bird.)

3. Origin or location French, Fleming, Scott, Holland (Lincolnshire rather than the country), Beckham (Norfolk), Martin (a French import and particularly numerous in early Sussex, where the conquerors often travelled through the county to their homeland of Normandy), Atherstone (Warwickshire), Corby (Northants) Freestone (most likely a man from a free or non serf holding), Osmon/Osman (early Norse probably a man from the following of the warrior Os), Boorman (speculative but probably someone who lived by a stream, 'bourne' eg Eastbourne still in use for a certain type of stream

4. Family all the Scottish 'Mac' clan names, Simmonds (Simon's son), Patterson (Peter's son), Harrison, Gill (unlikely, but just possibly may have come from the pet name for a woman Gilly of Gilgifu. Several of this name did descend from her around Staplehurst apparently).

This is just a very superficial overview, and a huge number of names fitting none of these categories has been added over the centuries. Much more on the

internet, but just as a postscript my own married name puts me at the very bottom of the pecking order - a Wright was someone who worked with their hands but without any particular skill, unlike a Cartwright or Wheelwright (Wheeler)! -Pat Wright

Bells Yew Green Village Hall

"They say that every cloud has a silver lining, and this has proved to be true as far as the village hall is concerned. Lockdown shut down all our classes and activities, of course - dancing, wood working, yogalates, kung fu, art and children's parties - to name just a few. However, on the bright side, Wealden DC had, in February, just awarded a Grant to the village hall committee to update the very tired kitchen, and when better to carry out the works than when the hall was unexpectedly closed? Five months later the work has been completed and the committee is the first to complete its project return to Wealden. The kitchen walls have been plastered, tiled and decorated, pipework has been boxed in, the lighting has been updated

with LEDs, the floor levelled, and the vinyl replaced. Frankly, it's barely recognisable, or, as one visitor said, "it looks far too good to be in a village hall!' We would like to thank Wealden DC for supporting our small but vibrant community's growth with their generous provision of the Community Grant. They have done this in a number of ways. including: that the work has allowed us to create a much more hygienic kitchen facility which is far easier to clean, and to a higher standard - something which is crucial in the current situation we find ourselves. The upgraded kitchen contributes to the hall's ability to generate a much more attractive community environment - even within the confines of social distancing. The project has completed the entire replacement of the outdated lighting in the building with its energy-saving and environmental benefits.

During the project we also discovered how many kind, generous and community-minded people there are living right on our doorstep! We asked if anyone could help us source good value tiles and they were offered to us, free of charge, by Burslem. Not only that, but they paid for the tiles to be installed as well as for the fitting of the wonderful new flooring that was donated by Sunniva. We are thrilled with the generosity of these lovely local folk and thank them again, very much indeed. We also thank our equally communityminded friends who have freely given their time and effort in all the hard work needed to plan and execute the refurbishment and clean up afterwards



- they know who they are, and so do we! Thank you.

On the subject of thanks due, our bookings manager, Chris Bacon resigned from the committee after ten years of dedicated service. As well as managing the hall's calendar, Chris was always happy to roll up his shirt sleeves, to paint or repair where needed or find someone who could get the jobs done. Thank you, Chris. The committee will miss his cheerful company but is delighted to announce that Holly Thomson has kindly agreed to take on the role and we welcome her aboard. At the time of writing we are preparing the hall for reopening, in compliance with the government guidance, and are looking forward to restarting its crucial role in our community."

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




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
