## News from the pews

In a year when one would think that not much can have happened due to lockdowns, isolations, limits on travel etc, it's amazing when we look back at what an awful lot did happened, not perhaps in the way that we're used to, but in different ways which have been super creative and imaginative.

All the online services have been good, but in November, the Remembrance Sunday on line service in which so many members of our two churches ranging in age from 2 to 96 years participated, was very special and was watched and appreciated by over 170 people. It was a moving moment when a trumpeter, standing at the heart of the community outside the Memorial Hall, sounded the last post.

The Sunday afternoon Festival Church services and Junior Church Forest School which were held in the Rectory paddock, continued to grow in popularity but had to stop during the November lockdown when we had to go back online.

In spite of the rain, another very special event was the open air Carol service, to which people came wrapped in many layers and carrying flasks of hot drinks. The paddock was divided into 'pens' for groups of six, separated by strings of lights and torches, there were also two blazing fire pits which gave the impression of warmth!

An excellent brass quintet playing arrangements of a good selection of well-known carols certainly lifted the spirits, and a scratch choir of nine provided some singing which was encouraging after nine months without live singing. We also heard the well-known Christmas Bible readings and Rev Brendan gave three short reflections on Christmas - the first Christmas when a child was born to suffer, the traditional Christmas as we have always known it, and then how very different this Christmas would be for everyone.

He spoke of the suffering of the homeless and the hungry, but this year especially for those who have been grievously and seriously affected by the covid virus, for them Christmas was likely to be a sad and anxious time. It was an unusual but truly uplifting Carol service. Arrangements for other services over the Christmas period were well in hand, with the Christmas eve

Crib service, which has always had an attendance of around 200 people, to be held in the Paddock.

Then on 19th December on account of the escalating number of virus cases, we heard that Kent was now in tier 4 category and no one from Kent was permitted to attend church in another area. This brought home to us how many of our congregation including Imtiaz, our Curate, live 'over the border', so once again Brendan had at short notice to do some quick rethinking and reorganising. After much thought the difficult decision was made to cancel the outside crib service, and put it online. The result was a charming presentation of the Christmas story done outside by our children and young people which was watched by 222 households. On Christmas morning services were held in both Churches, but I don't think it would be an exaggeration to say that for the first time in living memory there was no midnight Communion service in the Parish as most of the advanced bookings were cancelled. As Imtiaz, who was to have led morning services on December 27th was unable to 'cross the border', we were very grateful to Lesley Lynn who led a joint morning service in Eridge church. Our Ministry team met all these challenges brilliantly, and in spite of everything Christmas was celebrated in both of our churches.

Christmas is the time when most of us enjoy a bit of self indulgence, but it's also the time when our thoughts and prayers are with those who for whatever reason are in need. This year our Christmas giving supported The Diocese of Chichester Family Support Work, a charity which provides help to all kinds of families in Sussex, those of all faiths or none. Families which are struggling with issues such as poverty, ill health, learning difficulties, bereavement, family break up and domestic abuse. We were able to send gifts of food and also items suitable for Christmas gifts for all ages.

For many years now St Albans has supported the West Kent Women's Refuge and it has become traditional at Christmas to send them toiletries, items suitable for everyday use, but also luxury items to be given as gifts. We also have a special collection in the weeks before Christmas to enable us to

send them a gift of money which helps to buy the ladies and children some special Christmas treats. The sending of shoe boxes to eastern Europe which we have done for many years had to be suspended this year, instead we were asked to send money. The response was as always good and we were able to send £300 to enable families with very little to receive a little Christmas joy.

Anyone who has been to the Stables recently will have seen that we now have a new studio building in the grounds. This is to be the Church Office which has been made possible by donations from generous individuals for which we are very grateful. It will make a huge difference to the smooth running of the Parish.

In November we heard the sad news that Roy Dicker, husband of Audrey and former member of our church family had died. Roy served in the Royal Air Force ultimately as a Group Captain, then as a teacher in London, and in later years as a Lay Reader. He had been ill and frail for a long time, so although we can give thanks for his life and that he is now at peace, it is still a very sad time for Audrey to whom he was married for 60 years, and for his family.

Then just before Christmas it was a great shock when our Lay Reader, Roy Goodship died suddenly and unexpectedly. Roy who lived in Sevenoaks with his wife Gifty, had been a regular member of our congregation for about 10 years. As a Lay Reader, he gave us some very good and well informed sermons and was a tremendous help and support during the 18 month period of interregnum. Recently during lockdown he sent us regular scriptural reflections online. A solicitor by profession, Roy worked as a volunteer for the international charity The Gideons and he also led Sunday services in care homes in the Sevenoaks area. He was a scholarly man with a dry sense of humour, who used his gifts and abilities to serve others, we will miss him terribly.

At the beginning of the new year, In view of the sharp increase in cases of covid, the PCC made the difficult decision to discontinue services in our 2 churches until the situation improved. Frant church will still be open every Wednesday and Sunday for private prayer.

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
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## **Woof Meanderings**

## The Arts Society Ashdown Forest » The Guggenheim Museum, Bilbao and the Architecture of Frank Gehry 11th February 2021 at 2pm Lecturer: Sian Walters

The Guggenheim, designed by the Canadian architect Frank Gehry and opened to the public in 1997, is one of the most exciting buildings of the 20th Century. The lecture begins with an introduction to the Guggenheim foundation and how it came about, and then moves on to describe the very particular circumstances that led to the commission in Bilbao. It examines the architecture of Frank Gehry using illustrations from his work in Europe and America, and describes, with some beautifully detailed slides, how the vast asymmetrical, apparently chaotic and fragmented structure was created. It also discusses the use of titanium - the unusual and eye-catching material which is used to clad a large surface area of the building. The lecture ends with an introduction to the collection of paintings, sculptures and installations contained within the museum, covering the permanent collection as well as providing up-to-date information on current and future exhibitions. Projects for a new Guggenheim are also discussed.

The lecturer, Sian Walters, studied at Cambridge University. She is a lecturer at the National Gallery and The Wallace Collection and taught at Surrey University, specialising in 15th and 16th century Italian painting, Spanish art & architecture, and the relationship between dance and art. Also teaches private courses, and organises lectures, study days and art holidays abroad. Has lived in France and Italy, where she worked at the Peggy Guggenheim Museum in Venice.



#### New from our MP. Nus Ghani

Regrettably, we are in our third national lockdown. I've worked tirelessly to keep Wealden out of the toughest level of restrictions under the tier system and it is regrettable to be in a third national lockdown. However, with infection rates of the new strain increasing and one person in 50 now infected, we must abide by the strict lockdown rules and prevent further spread.

We have some good news with the numbers of people vaccinated already greater than those across Europe, which is a tremendous achievement by the Government. But we must keep up the speed and scale up vaccinations to ensure that the top 13 million of the most vulnerable people are vaccinated by mid-February.

The Government have said that the restrictions will begin to lift once the most clinically vulnerable people, and front-line health and care workers are vaccinated. So, despite the logistical difficulties in rural areas like ours, my absolute focus is getting the vaccine into every part of Wealden as fast as possible. I am pleased that the Uckfield Meads Medical Centre was amongst the first local hubs for community vaccinations, and more sites will be introduced soon.

Many Wealden residents are being contacted by the NHS to have their vaccinations in Brighton or East Grinstead. Please honour these appointments and get vaccinated.

Please note that the vaccination list is managed centrally, and I cannot fast track your vaccination nor can your GP.

#### **»** Vaccination

Some sites have been easier to prepare and so could go live more quickly, whilst other sites have needed more preparatory work to ensure teams can safely offer the vaccine in line with national guidance. GP practices are working at pace to make sure the preparations and checks take place as quickly as possible so that sites can go live as soon as possible all across Wealden and East Sussex.

Please be patient and note that the NHS will let eligible patients know when it is their turn to have the vaccine.

Here's more information about the process and answers to frequently asked questions.

• In the UK, there are two approved COVID-19 vaccines. They both require

two doses to provide longer lasting protection. Both have been shown to be effective in clinical trials and have a good safety record.

- When more vaccine becomes available, the vaccines will be offered to other people at risk as soon as possible.
- People most at risk from the complications of COVID-19 are being offered the vaccine first. This includes older adults in care homes and frontline health and social care workers.
- The COVID-19 vaccination is only available through the NHS to eligible groups and it is a free vaccination.

Then the vaccine will also be offered in age order to:

- Those aged over 80 years
- Those aged over 75 years
- Those aged over 70 years
- Adults on the nhs shielded patient list
- Those aged over 65 years
- Adults under 65 years with long term conditions (see list below)
- Those aged 50-64 will be offered it

## **Clinical conditions list:**

- A blood cancer (such as leukaemia, lymphoma or myeloma)
- Diabetes
- Dementia
- A heart problem
- A chest complaint or breathing difficulties, including bronchitis, emphysema or severe asthma
- A kidney disease
- A liver disease
- Lowered immunity due to disease or treatment (such as hiv infection, steroid medication, chemotherapy or radiotherapy)
- Rheumatoid arthritis, lupus or psoriasis
- Have had an organ transplant
- Had a stroke or a transient ischaemic attack (tia)
- A neurological or muscle wasting condition
- · A severe or profound learning disability
- A problem with your spleen, e.G. Sickle cell disease, or you have had your spleen removed
- Those seriously overweight (bmi of 40 and above)
- Those severely mentally ill

## At the same time the vaccine will also be offered to:

- Adults who provide regular care for an elderly or disabled person
- Younger adults in long stay nursing and

residential settings

Please wait your turn. If you are not in the groups above, you will have to wait for a COVID-19 vaccination until more supplies are available.

When more vaccines become available, they will be offered it to more groups of the population.

## » Frequently Asked Questions I am in one of the listed groups above, why do I have to wait?

The COVID-19 vaccines will become available as they are approved for use and as each batch is manufactured. So, every dose is needed to protect those at highest risk. You will be called in as soon as there is enough vaccine available. Some people who are housebound or live in a care home and who can't get to a local vaccination centre may have to wait for supply of the right type of vaccine. This is because only some vaccines can be transported between people's homes.

## Where can I get my COVID-19 vaccination?

Vaccines will be offered in a range of settings. Some vaccination teams will visit people to offer the vaccine, for example in care homes, other people may have to go to the nearest centre. Because some of the vaccine has to be stored in a very low temperature freezer, you may not be able to get the vaccine in your normal GP surgery.

## What if the centre I am offered is not easy to get to?

Please try to attend the vaccination centre you are offered. If you cannot attend that centre, you may have to wait to get the vaccine in a more convenient location.

## » Contact

I am holding weekly virtual surgeries (including Saturday and Sunday) throughout the lockdown period to help with urgent cases. If you would like to make an appointment, please visit my website, fill in the appointment form and return it to me by email.

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

### Frant Bowls Club is 100 years old.

We need your help - do you recognise any of these long forgotten Frant bowlers? Mashewick, Cambridge, Bassett, Field, Price, Plume, Grinham, Manktelow, Rhode and Morris were all original Frant Bowls Club members in the 1920s. Do these names bring back old memories of bowlers past?

Have a look at this photo which was taken in 1925. Can you identify any of the people in the picture? They might be your great-grandfather or a forebear's gardener, chauffeur or even the local postman, baker or cobbler. You can also see just how small the original Memorial Hall was.

Frant Memorial Hall, built as a memorial to Frant villagers who fought in the Great War, was opened by Lady Henry Nevill on the 15th December 1920. The land on which the bowls green and Hall stands was given to the village by the Marquis Camden. In the early days of the Club the membership comprised local people from all walks of life.

Frant bowls green was laid by volunteers during 1920 to encourage the local community to participate in social activities after the devastating WW1.

Local newspapers indicate that Frant's first match was played on Friday July 15th 1921 against Rusthall Bowling Club. Frant won after a keenly contested game.

This year is Frant Bowls Club's centenary year. But Covid-19 has put paid to any celebrations this year which are now planned to take place during 2022.

As a result the Club wants to gather information about the early days and of course the personalities involved. We are planning to produce a centennial chronicle which will include photos, newspaper clippings and stories.

#### Stay at home

You must stay at home and you are only allowed to leave your homes for the following reasons:

- Shop for basic necessities, for you or a vulnerable person.
- Go to work, or provide voluntary or charitable services, if you cannot reasonably do so from home.
- Exercise with your household (or support bubble) or one other person. This should be limited to once per day, and you should not travel outside your local area.
- Meet your support bubble or childcare bubble where necessary, but only if you are legally permitted to form one.
- Seek medical assistance or avoid injury, illness or risk of harm (including domestic abuse).
- Attend education or childcare for those eligible.

## **Support for businesses**

In light of the national restrictions, the Chancellor has announced an additional support to the most affected businesses across the country, worth £4.6 billion.

Retail, hospitality and leisure business premises forced to close can claim a one-off grant of up to £9,000. This one-

off grant is in addition to the existing monthly closed grants of up to £3,000 per month that businesses continue to be eligible for. Businesses can receive multiple grants, as they are eligible on a per premises basis. Local authorities will receive the funding for these one-off grants next week and make payments to businesses as soon as possible.

Local Authorities in England will also be given an additional £500 million of discretionary funding to support other businesses not eligible for the grants.

#### >> Frant Parish Survey 2020-21

Due to the COVID pandemic, the Parish council was thwarted in its efforts to widely distribute the survey last year. Although we had well over 100 responses these came very largely from Frant villagers and from older members of our community. Frant Parish Council feel, therefore, that the voices of a wider, more varied cohort should be heard and to that end a decision has been made to re-launch the survey. Royal Mail will pop hard copies through your doors early in February; please do take the 10 minutes it will take to feedback your views so that plans for the future can reflect these...and don't forget to get your teenagers involved too-after all it is their future too.

## » Erosion on The Green

As a result of the combined effect of frequent, heavy rain and inconsiderate drivers Frant Green is looking a little dishevelled at the edges. As Trustees of the Green, Frant Parish Council recently engaged the services of a local consultancy to take advice as to what might be done to mitigate the effects of erosion and prevent further damage in the future. Consideration of options and recommendations is now underway

and the Council will report further once there is an affordable way forward. In the meantime, we must impress on all that:

- Wilful damage (i.e. when a person was aware of the risk of damage) e.g. by vehicles, bicycles, horses etc.
- The driving of a vehicle across grassed areas.
- Parking of a vehicle on the grass unless with permission from the Parish Council.

Are all prohibited. Should the Council have to carry out its own works in relation to repairs or reinstatement, or employ a contractor to do so, all costs (including legal) incurred will be automatically charged to those individuals responsible for the damage or alteration.

## **»** COVID-19 Support

Unfortunately, we are now in a further lockdown but with hope on the horizon in the form of the vaccine roll out. The latest information on the vaccination programme in Sussex is available on the Sussex Health and Care Partnership website, https://www.sussexhealthandcare.uk/keepsussexsafe/sussex-covid-19-vaccination-programme/including an FAQ, public leaflets and a list of vaccination sites.

Wealden District Council continue to provide their Community Hub service which can be accessed through https:// www.wealden.gov.uk/press-andmedia/coronavirus-covid-19-latest/ community-support/

Shielding guidance is now in place for clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV) people across the country. Those in the CEV group should not attend work, school, college or university, and limit the time they spend outside the home. They should only go out for medical appointments, exercise or if it is essential. People in the CEV group can once again register on NSSS for priority supermarket deliveries, and request free pharmacy deliveries, whilst shielding guidance is in place.

East Sussex County Council will again be contacting CEV people in Wealden and throughout East Sussex by phone, letter and email during the new national lockdown to ensure they have the support they need. They aim to have contacted all identified CEV residents we have details for within the next few weeks.

Here are a few of our highlights;

• During this lockdown the children are now being taught through live online lessons using Google Classroom. During term 2 staff had training on how to use







this, never expecting to actually put it into practice so soon. The teachers from day 1 of this term have delivered these lessons to all children every day. Feedback from parents and children has been very positive – the children have benefited from seeing their teacher, their friends and being able to ask for support immediately. Without doubt, this provision is a step change from the last lockdown when the technology was not available to us.

• Mrs Douch has continued to support the school with PE – critical worker children in school have lessons twice a week and activities are provided via the school website for children to do at home. We had also taken part, very successfully, in virtual events organised in term 2. We are hoping for a return to sporting events at some point this year!

• Although it seems a while ago, our online Nativity and Carol Concerts were absolutely amazing with the children performing so well. Parents, although clapping from home, managed to watch their children live and enjoy these wonderful events. Christmas lunch went ahead in two sittings with staff serving and cleaning up, the Christmas post-box was used safely and the PTFA kindly organised for selection boxes for all children and funded class Christmas parties. So, all in all a happy end to term 2.

 Our new children in reception class have settled in so well and are also thriving with online lessons, sharing their work and chatting to their teacher.

I continue to be grateful for the support from the staff, parents and

our PTFA who all seem to find ways to remain kind and supportive. The children deserve their own mention as they keep smiling, they adapt and they try their very best with their learning. I know it is hard for them, but I am sure they will be more resilient and independent learners as a result.


