

News from the Pews

Although we might appear to have hit a quiet time as far as Church news goes, there is plenty going on behind the scenes. Preparing and filming online services is very time consuming, but the numbers joining these services, including the service on Ash Wednesday, have remained consistently and gratifyingly high. Another area of busy activity is keeping the momentum going with Youth work, keeping in touch with our children and young people, and also staying in touch with as many people as possible while home and hospital visiting is not permitted. The Church has continued to be open for private prayer and quiet time every Wednesday and Sunday between 10am and 2pm.

Sadly The Stables has had to remain closed throughout the winter which has meant not only a considerable loss of income, but people have really missed





the friendship and fellowship at the weekly Coffee Mornings, the Toddler Group and all the other groups which have met regularly. It isn't known at the moment when we will be permitted to reopen. On the positive side, the new Church office in the Stables yard is now up and running.

So now we have to plan for the future post covid. As a very small parish, probably one of the smallest numerically in the Diocese, we don't have all the resources of bigger parishes, but we are very fortunate in having the Rectory paddock which can be utilised in many ways to build a unique rural ministry. One major area of planning is to develop outside Festival Church services which proved so popular last autumn. Also many of you will have heard about our 'Forest School' initiative which was really taking off last autumn, with the village school as well as other parishes showing an interest in sharing our facilities and learning from the experience of Ed our Youth and Children's worker who is now fully trained in this area of youth work. It's a good feeling to be able to share something that we are so fortunate to have with others.

The Church re opens for services (socially distanced and without singing) on 14th March, so a step in the right direction. The churchyard is about the only area of life unaffected by a year of uncertainty and disruption, and is looking as lovely as it always does in the spring.

When you read this article the children will all be back at school. Although we have been in lockdown since the start of the year, we have continued here at Frant to be very busy. Before I comment on some of our highlights I have to say a few thank yous. The children have been absolutely amazing, they have taken to online live teaching lessons brilliantly and they have engaged and submitted

work every day. I am so proud of all of them. All our parents have, yet again, embraced home learning and the use of the Google Classroom for lessons. They have managed to juggle home, school and work life magnificently. I know it is not easy and I can probably predict they do not want another lockdown! The staff at school have all adopted a 'can do' attitude to online teaching from day 1 and have come up with creative ways to add variety to the school week. We have had just over a third of the school in Keyworker School during this time so staff have managed keyworker school and home school. Again, not sure how I can thank them enough.

Earlier in the term I sat at my desk and shed a few tears due to the extraordinary generosity of an ex-school family who wished to support the school financially. They donated a very substantial sum of money to school, enabling us to buy a set of touch screen laptops to support our children. We are also going to be able to buy headphones, IT software and equipment as well as books to support all children but particularly children who struggle with their learning and need extra resources. The community has been and continues to be so supportive of this great school. Thank you all.

Here are a few of our highlights: Every day all children have been logging on to the Google Classrooms to take part in live lessons with their teachers. It has been lovely to see their faces on the screen interacting and sharing their work.

In PE, Mrs Douch continues to teach our keyworker children twice a week and has plans in place for lots of activities this term for the whole school.

All the children have focused on online safety as well as mental health activities to keep them positive and engaged.

World Book Day (4th March) was a wonderful event with staff reading stories to the children across the school and the children having a day of reading related activities. Do take a look on our website for lots of photos and stories.

I hope you have enjoyed reading our news. Please do contact the school at any time if you have any questions or would just like to say hello. I am in school every day and will always find time for a chat. At some point we will be able to welcome people back into school.



Life after lockdown in our Parish



News from MP, Nus Ghani

Vaccines are our way out of this pandemic. I am pleased that the rollout has been a great success across Wealden and every day we continue to make great progress towards beating the virus in our communities. Some sites have taken longer to set up than others, but the NHS in East Sussex made clear from the beginning that nobody would be forgotten. Our local health authorities have done a fantastic job and I thank them for all their efforts.

We have reached our goal of offering a vaccine to the top four priority groups by 15 February, and the East Sussex vaccination programme and the fightback against the virus continues in full swing.

I visited the Crowborough Covid-19 vaccination site at Saxonbury House surgery to thank the medical staff and volunteers, and experience first-hand the fantastic work being carried out to vaccinate Wealden residents against Coronavirus. Saxonbury House surgery has been administering the vaccine since mid-January, vaccinating patients not only from Crowborough, but also other surgeries in the area. The medical team is supported by a team of volunteers and together they ensure that up to 600 people are vaccinated at the surgery every day.

Each dose administered represents a triumph over the virus. I would like to urge everyone who has been invited to book an appointment but not yet done so, please do to take up the offer as soon as possible.

Additionally, accessible testing is a cornerstone of local outbreak management and it is especially important for a rural constituency such as Wealden to have easy access to Covid testing. I am pleased that the testing capacity across the constituency continues to expand, with testing walk-through testing sites available in Crowborough and Hailsham.

I continue to work hard to ensure that your concerns are heard in Westminster. If you need my assistance, please email me at nusrat.ghani.mp@parliament.uk.

Frant Film

Is that light at the end of a very long tunnel, or is it a locomotive hurtling towards us? Or, is it the illumination from the Frant Film projector as we open for our first film in over a year?



We showed our last film on the 6th March 2020, "Bohemian Rhapsody" and then we went into the first lockdown. We therefore "owe" our members two films unshown in Season 11 "The Piano" and "The Pink Panther Strikes Again".

Our next season, number 12, will start with these two and then 8 more. Our plan is to recommence in October. But, as we all know, that depends on how we, and the virus behave.

I realise that not all my readers will know about Frant Film, maybe they are new to our community, so here is a potted history.

After kicking the idea around for a while we obtained Lottery funding in 2011, purchased the equipment and showed a short season. Our first full season, 8 films, Started in October 2011. The films are chosen by our committee but we always welcome suggestions from our members. The films are screened on Friday evenings at 8pm.

There is a bar open from 7pm, and we encourage patrons to stay on after the film for feedback and discussion.

We are non-profit making and any

surplus funds, at the end of each season, are donated to the Memorial Hall. Since the first film was screened, 'It's Complicated'', we are proud to have donated more than £10,000 to the Hall. This supplements the Halls income which is used for maintenance, repair and refurbishment.

So here are two things for our community to do:

1) The renewal notice of membership will be sent out, in the normal way, to our members. Please re-join and can we also ask you to try to recruit your friends and neighbours as new members. We must stress that you don't have to live in the Parish, we have members from as far away as Rotherfield and Tunbridge Wells!

2) We are always open to suggestions as to the films, in fact we welcome feedback.



Frant Parish Council

The Parish Council continues to meet virtually, on Zoom, but the latest news from the government brings some hope that we can finally meet in person again this summer. Virtual meetings are not the best forum for debate and discussion but so far we haven't descended into the chaos of Handforth Parish Council!

One major project that the Parish Council has been discussing is the proposal for a pedestrian crossing on the A267. This plan has been on and off the



drawing board for a long as I have been a councillor, but it has received fresh impetus thanks to the new development at Fern Close. The benefits of having a safe place to cross the increasingly busy road are clear, particularly with a primary school in the heart of Frant village. However, the project does have some disadvantages, most notably the extra street lighting that is required through the centre of the village to ensure that the crossing is safe. While the safety of our residents is paramount, preserving the rural nature of our village is also an important consideration. The Parish Council is looking into "heritage" lighting plans, and we are hoping to produce some designs for public consideration in the near future.

On the subject of lighting, we installed a solar-powered light for the twitten from Rushlye Close to Bayham Road. This is one of the first solar-powered streetlights installed in East Sussex, and we were excited to be leading the way with a "green solution". Unfortunately, our cloudy winter has not delivered enough sunshine to keep the light on! We have been working closely with the manufacturer, who is keen to see the technology succeed, and are now upgrading the panels to enhance the performance. We are optimistic that

this will solve the problems that we have experienced so far.

A perennial problem we experience in the Parish is roadside litter. Its particularly noticeable in Spring as, despite the warmer weather, grass verges are short and roadside hedges are bare. I would like to pay particular tribute to those residents of the Parish who "litter pick", and in particular two councillors, Deborah Park and Andrew MacDonald-Brown, who are dedicated pickers. The Parish Council has some equipment available for litter picking, including long handled "grabbers", so if any residents want to organise a litter pick, then please do let us know and we will equip you!

Finally, as thoughts turn to summer and the end of the lockdown restrictions, the Parish Council is contemplating ways to mark our regained freedoms. Last year we had to cancel our Frant Village Fair, but this summer might be the perfect opportunity to revisit the idea of an event. Watch this space...




