One of the messages I got was "What a lovely community you have."

We so often see on the news the awful reality of

our human nature in terrible acts of evil, but we don't always highlight tremendous acts of kindness and good that also go on somewhat below the radar.

What is it that inspires one person to be generous to a stranger? What inspires such acts of care and kindness? What brings people together?

I was hugely inspired by the response we had to our lead theft on Frant Church, an act of destruction met by the community with generosity and care. I am pleased to say that thanks to so many we covered the costs, and have now fully replaced the roof, along with a 24/7 monitored alarm. There is still redecorating to be done which resulted from the damaged roof, but I am truly thankful to our community.

Times of difficulty and distress met with love and action.

My ultimate inspiration comes from God. God made the world, and we continue in so many ways to mess it up. Yet God meets us in our difficulty and distress, he came to us in Jesus Christ, he died for us on the cross for our forgiveness, and he offers the hands of friendship to those who never knew him.

Let's be inspired in 2023 into a response to God and others, of love, friendship, generosity and care. - Reverend Brendan Martin



News from the Pews

Our two jazz concerts in October and November were 'different', great fun and very well attended. They also completed our fundraising for replacing the lead on the church roof. The work was eventually completed on 6th December by Archer Roofing Services, who for no further cost also sealed around the base of the flag pole where the rain was coming in onto the bell frames, and repointed one wall of the south turret. Our thanks to David Torr for seeing through to completion this very complicate process, and to Jamie Archer for his generosity and expertise. There are now cameras and alarms in place in case we have another visit from thieves.

In 2022 as part of our 'Year of Creation' we got a team together to look at ways in which our churches can become more sustainable. Not easy when we're dealing with two of the biggest and most inefficient buildings in the Parish. We registered with the eco church charity 'Arocha' and were delighted at the end of the year to be given a Silver Award for our efforts. One thing which has always been an issue in St Albans is caring for our organ, which is a very special and significant instrument and needs to be kept at a constant temperature. To enable us to turn the heating in the church, which is not often used during the week, right down, the organ mechanism, which has its own little cupboard known as the 'blowers cupboard', now has its own modest heater. Hopefully this will keep the organ happy and lower out fuel consumption.

News from Ed Pascoe our Youth and Families Minister - In October we hosted a youth gathering 'Unite in the Wild', organised by Youth for Christ. 59 teenagers from the Tunbridge Wells area enjoyed a full day of worship, talks, archery, wide games, crafts, fire lighting, den building and walks. The day ended with a barbecue and s'mores (ask Ed!) round the camp fire. It sounds exhausting for the organisers and helpers, but it was great to see the young people from our church interacting with other Christians from the area, being together and joining in the unsophisticated, energetic, healthy outdoor activities which young people have always enjoyed. It was gratifying to receive so much positive feedback from all who attended.

Our Christmas season began on 4th December, Advent Sunday with a 'Walking Nativity', where 11 children from our church acted out the Christmas story at different stations through the churchyard. We finished in church with Christingles and everyone 'passing on the light' to each other as they lit their candles. Over 80 people attended, 37 of them children.

As in past years, in December our youth group had its annual ice-skating trip to the Calverley Park ice rink. Needless to say a great time was had by all. A new venture for Ed was a new

Lego Bible Club, which was a great success with 11 pupils from Frant School attending the after school club. Each week they were set a challenge to build something out of Lego, and then watch a Lego Bible film clip based on what they were learning that week. The subjects included the Garden of Eden, the Tower of Babel, Escaping from Egypt and the Ten Commandments. Ed designed this specifically for school years 2-4, and was the first time he had led a group this young. Again the great positive feedback was very encouraging.

Due to a sudden very heavy snowfall on 11th December, our Christmas Carol Service was somewhat different this year. By late afternoon the village was virtually cut off, so in contrast to the full church we usually see, there were only 35 adults and 9 children. Our faithful organist, Peter de Croos, did his best to get to us from Ightham where he had been playing the organ earlier in the day, but was foiled at the bottom of Frant hill which was closed. After some quick re-thinking by our ever adaptable Rector, the congregation sang along to recordings of all the well known carols. Those who did attend said that it was still a lovely service.

Stuck indoors on a freezing cold day in December writing this for the January edition, it doesn't seem possible that by the time we're reading the next edition, it will be March and we'll be into the season of daffodils and lambs. Happy New Year!

Defibrillators - A Few Key Facts

There are 60,000 out of hospital cardiac arrests in the UK every year. Currently only about 10% of those affected survive.

With bystander assistance through CPR and the use of a defibrillator however that survival rate increases to over 30%.

More than half out of hospital cardiac arrests are associated with heart rhythms that could be treated with a defibrillator and the majority of those people survive if they receive prompt CPR and defibrillation from bystanders.

Please support this good cause and help make the village a safer place in the event of someone suffering a cardiac arrest.

Frant Parish Council Some good news! East Sussex Council have approved match funding of some $\pounds 50,000$ to go towards the costs of the pedestrian crossing in Frant. This means that scraping together all the resources we currently have we can now proceed with actually building the crossingcurrent estimates £250,000 It means of course, that until this major project is complete the Parish Council has to be particularly frugal as there is not much 'wriggle' room to use a technical term! It will be a major



potentially life saving achievement though and no small feat for a Parish Council whose annual income is less than £50,000 per annum.

The pressure on our roads is a cause of increasing concern. Together with Rotherfield Parish Council we are engaging in speed surveys to do something about the current speed limits at Eridge and we are conducting a feasability study for the Wadhurst junction in Frant. The frustrating thing about tackling our roads is it requires the engagement of a number of 'partners' who all seem to travel at their own pace!

As I write this the snow is still thick on the ground and largely due to SAT NAV I suspect, cars have been sent down our East Sussex hilly lanes ill equipped to deal with 3-4 inches of snow and then ice. The result I'm afraid has been chaos and many accidents.

To end on a positive note, as it is that time of year after all, you may recall that we were one of the first Parish Councils to trial a solar panelled street light in Bells Yew Green. Well, it appears to be working well and a great success. We will now be actively looking to also put in charging points for electric cars in one or two locations as a community resource.

And finally, just a reminder 2023 are the elections for your Parish councillors -May I believe. So if any of you want to get involved and have a positive impact on your community talk to us and think about getting elected!

Parish past

With a hosepipe ban only recently lifted, water has been much in the news this summer, which would be no surprise to past residents, as within the lifetime of some of us Frant and Bells Yew Green had no mains water supply at all. This was only connected and formally opened by Lord Camden amid much rejoicing in 1936. Two large reservoirs had previously been dug and the Tangier Lane pumping station built to supply most of Tunbridge Wells, but the problem for Frant was that much more pumping power was needed to get the necessary quantity of water up our hill and thence to BYG. As always money was the problem but eventually over £10,000 was raised by the water company - I guess over a million equivalent today - and not just a more powerful pump purchased but over five miles of pipe laid.

At the opening ceremony the water board chairman proudly announced that all these works had happily come in under budget - a lesson for today perhaps? Before this connection both villages were forced to rely on varied sources: the two main covered wells still visible in Frant today (there is a photo of nurses having to carry buckets from these wells all the way to Shernfold while this was a military hospital during the First World War, above), some private wells in gardens, the springs in Chase Wood on Frant Hill and the slope beyond Warren Ridge, even the village pond and Shernfold lake. Obviously some of these were contaminated, nor did any supply sufficient water to fight the occasional fire. Eridge, not having the height difficulty, had long enjoyed an earlier supply - no doubt there were jokes that Frant would now finally reach cleanliness! BYG did have a highly unsatisfactory well on the green, or, if you were energetic, there was a trudge to the brewery where a deeper, safer supply existed. We forget how much of our ancestors'

time and effort was consumed just heaving buckets of dubious water, not to mention the diseases and parasites brought by unclean supply. -Pat Wright

Title: "Hogarth: a Harlot, a Rake and a Marriage" Lecturer: Hilary Williams 12th January 2023 at 2pm Crowborough Community Centre Pine Grove Crowborough TN6 1FE

Formerly Print Room Superintendent at the British Museum and now Art History Education Officer, Hilary lectures for the British Museum, London Borough of Bexley and the Wallace Collection. William Hogarth (1697-1764) aimed to be the first, native born leader of the British School of painting. As a Londoner, he was in a city which claimed to be 'the capital of the world' during his

lifetime.

With great wealth, there was great social deprivation. Hogarth used his art, especially his remarkable prints, to spread a social message, often laced with satire. Through drawings, prints and oil paintings and packed with great stories, this lecture discusses his series of compositions for his Harlot's Progress (1732), The Rake's Progress (1732-5) pictured above, and his Marriage-a-la-Mode (1743-5) and what they mean.
