This week I have seen the Union Flag bunting starting to appear in shops and houses as we look forward to the Coronation of King Charles III. The country prepares for great celebrations and pageantry!

Charles when he was Prince of Wales, came to my school when I was a boy, and I very much remember the privilege of standing in amongst the 1200 students he greeted. I was standing about 5 rows back from those shaking hands with him, but still a nice memory.

I guess we will all have our royal connections which we will no doubt share over the coronation weekend. On Sunday in Frant and Eridge Churches we will be holding Special Commemorative Services for the Coronation, with prayers for the King on Sunday 7th.

As I write the details of the Coronation service itself are still to be announced, it will bring longstanding Coronation tradition and the profound historical meaning, into our modern age. During the service in Westminster Abbey the King will be anointed, blessed, and consecrated by the Archbishop of Canterbury, much of it remaining unchanged since the Coronation of King Edgar in 973.

At every Coronation a passage is heard from 1 Kings, when Zadok the Priest and Nathan the Prophet anointed King David's son, Solomon as

King, and the people shouted "long live the King." Solomon would continue the throne of his Father David, which would be an everlasting Kingdom.

The Coronation service of King Charles will reverberate with that history as he is crowned, both in the service of his country and commonwealth, but also in the service of God as supreme governor of the Church of England, part of the Kingdom of God. His crown holds together the secular and the spiritual, the earthly and the eternal.

God's everlasting Kingdom continues, not merely through kings and countries, but through one man, the Son of David and King of Kings. Jesus was unique in that he was crowned twice. He was crowned with a crown of thorns at his death on the cross, and although this crown was done in contempt by the people at the time, it was literally his crowning achievement.

We just celebrated Easter, for on the cross Jesus died for us, he died for our forgiveness, he was punished instead of us, he died to save us from our sins.

Jesus was then crowned in heaven. The physical resurrection of Jesus not only proves that there is life after death, but means that Jesus has defeated sin and death for us. God's Kingdom is indeed an everlasting Kingdom.

We hold the earthly and the eternal in our minds and hearts as we say together: Long live the King!





#### **News From The Pews**

Easter has come and gone and time rushes on - faster each year, or so it seems. There were a good number of adults and children in church for the Easter morning service, with a surprise bonus for the children of an Easter egg hunt in the churchyard. Festival Church, the Sunday afternoon services held in the Rectory paddock re started after the winter break in late March. It was rather a quiet start, due partly to the appalling weather.

At the end of last year it was suggested that we reconfigure the stairs in the Stables to make it possible for a partition with a door to be constructed in the hall at the foot of the stairs. This would allow the Pascoe family and any subsequent tenant of the first floor flat privacy and security. Thanks to some generous donations, the work was able to go ahead and was completed in February, it looks very good and is a great improvement.

At the end of March, 30 ladies from our congregations attended the 'Women's Breakfast'. It's probably not at all politically correct to say so, but it was really good to have some ladies only time, to meet together, be waited on and enjoy each other's company! After much chat and a delicious breakfast, (not a fry up, but a large number of pastries were consumed!) we watched a video made by Charlie Mackesy, the Christian author of the book 'The boy, the mole, the fox and the horse', which is described by the adventurer and writer, Bear Grylls as 'The book which speaks the universal language of love, friendship and kindness,' everyone should read it. We also listened to a brief talk by Caroline Creedy Smith, our Pastoral Care co ordinator. This was inevitably followed by more chat, (and a bit more eating) and no one was in a great hurry to leave. It is hoped that this can be repeated later in the year.

In March we were saddened by the death of Ian McNeil (the classic car man). Once again we're surprised by how little we actually know about our friends and acquaintances until after their death. Ian was born in Crewe and always had a very adventurous, or as his mother would say over adventurous nature! Motor cycle scrambling was one of his early interests, and at 16 he learned to drive a Bond three wheeler remember those?. Having completed his apprenticeship with Rolls Royce he joined the Pilot Training Course with BA/BOAC then went on to Oxford Air Training School. He completed his training in 1968 and began his career as a pilot in Long Haul flying, starting with VC10s, then going on to fly Tristars, 767s and finally 747s. He had a wonderful career which took him all over the world. He had many hobbies, he loved wind surfing, sailing and skiing, and at one time he just had to 'have a go' at Hang gliding, a sport almost unheard of in the UK at the time. He made a Hang glider from patterns he bought from the States - and jumped! But his greatest love was his classic cars which attracted great interest when he brought them to village events, the last occasion being the Jubilee celebrations in 2022. After his retirement, Ian and his wife Sue bought an apartment in Mallorca which allowed him to spend time for 22 years sailing the Balearics. They started attending St Albans when their son Alastair and his wife Lucy were preparing to be married here. Sadly Alastair had already been diagnosed with an inoperable brain tumour, and Sue said that during this

time being members of St Albans was like being cared for by a big loving family. When Alastair died five years later, Ian played a significant part in the lives of his toddler grandsons, Harry and Alfie, which meant that once again, he was teaching little boys to ride their bikes. He took them skiing, brought them to church and watched over them as they grew up without their dad. Sue said that Ian's Christian faith although very private remained very strong.

This month, people from across the country and the Commonwealth will come together in celebration of the Coronation of His Majesty The King and Her Majesty The Queen Consort. It will be a historic occasion as it is the first Coronation of a British monarch since the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in 1953.

The Coronation will take place at Westminster Abbey on Saturday 6th May 2023 with all the long-standing traditions and pageantry that best exemplifies our nation. A Coronation ceremony can be traced back more than 1,000 years and today, the United Kingdom is the only European monarchy to retain such a ceremony. The special Bank Holiday weekend will include an extensive programme of events across the nation, for families and communities to come together and celebrate this unique moment for our country.

On Sunday 7th May 2023, The Coronation Big Lunch will provide an opportunity to share food and fun in a nationwide act of celebration and friendship. A special Coronation Concert will also take place on this day at Windsor Castle. The centrepiece of the Coronation Concert, 'Lighting up the Nation', will see the country join in celebration as iconic locations across the United Kingdom are lit up using projections, lasers, drone displays and illuminations.

On Monday 8th May 2023, members of the public will be invited to take part in The Big Help Out, which will encourage people to try volunteering for themselves and join the work being undertaken to support their local areas.

#### Why I Play Lawn Green Bowls.

It all began in the early eighties. Playing the game of bowls was never an ambition and never featured as a sport in which I would be involved. I had watched bowls matches from the 'ring-side' when my grandfather played on a bowls green in Kingston-upon-Thames. This was before my teens but I was never allowed or invited to bowl on the hallowed turf. Much too young.

We moved to Frant in 1980 from Romsey, near Southampton. As Frant was a village we wanted to get involved in someway with the local community. Bowls however had always seemed only for the elderly. You can picture the event. A warm, sunny afternoon with elderly gents perhaps smoking an aromatic pipe and matronly ladies some in tweeds walking up and down the green.

One day a very good friend of ours invited us to go to Frant Bowls Club. The introductions were friendly. Questions about past experience in the game of bowls were brief. I didn't have any bowls and had no idea about handling a bowl.

The members to whom I was introduced were nearly all locals living in Frant. Some were old, some were younger, some were brusque and some were very helpful. Just what you'd expect in a small local club - real mixture of talents and characters. However although I had none of my own could borrow a set of bowls from the club.

My birthday was approaching. My mother knew about my new interest in bowls and having scanned the small ads in a local paper bought me a set. They were second hand, old but in remarkably good condition and made from lignum vitae, an extremely hard wood. It is a very dense wood and rumour has it that instead of floating in water it sinks. Bowls today are made from a composite material resistant to knocks and bashes which inevitably occur on the green.

At the time of joining we both had full-time jobs involving long hours. sometimes arriving home at six o'clock or later on some evenings. After changing into 'greys' or 'whites' going right out again to take part in a bowls match.

Today we both have new, individual sets of bowls. However the decision to have new bowls was quite difficult. My wooden bowls had enabled me to win a

number of competitions and matches. They had a very wide bias. This meant I could bowl my wood on the extreme edge of a rink and the bowl would curl in behind the jack sometimes to the amazement of my fellow players. New bowls meant sacrificing that facility. However, despite the winning characteristics, my old bowls were really too large and it was time to change to a more contemporary set which were more comfortable to handle and dare I say a bit more accurate.

Frant started playing lawn green bowls in the early 1920s and is a game requiring strategy, deftness of touch, an esprit de corps and good humour. In addition, and there is always a slight downside to membership, a willingness to play your part in maintaining the fabric of the club. The club house needs constant care, the area around the green requires cutting and the bowls green itself needs its share of TLC cutting it three times a week during the season.

Club membership clearly has its rewards. Our club has matches at Home and Away from April to September and the venues are within Sussex and Kent.

Frant bowls club has a good reputation throughout the bowling fraternity and whether we win or lose its the game that matters. Many of our members have known other club members for several years and always are happy to renew friendships.

Frant Bowls Club has practice opportunities on usually Tuesday afternoons and evenings. Matches are arranged on Wednesdays and Saturdays. There maybe matches on a couple of Sundays. To add to the enjoyment we have various club competitions which are open to all members.

When the final bowl is delivered at a Home match or practice session a good way to finish off is to congratulate the winners or indeed the losers and give your opposite number either a glass of wine, or a beer or soft drink.

#### **Give Poetry a Platform**

Give Poetry a Platform brings the spoken and written word to railway stations in East Sussex and Kent. The project is the result of a successful two year collaboration between Southeast Rail CRP and the Kent and Sussex Poetry Society. QR codes provide audio recordings of poets reading their work, with the accompanying text on display.



Frant station houses the first display with Tunbridge Wells now included this week. Further stations along the Hastings to Tonbridge line are scheduled to increase the reach of the project celebrating poetry in our public spaces and elevating our local stations.

#### Where is Eridge: continued

In the magazine for March/April 2023 I wrote about Eridge and how it isn't very obvious as a settlement. It is more of an area or district than a place like Frant or Rotherfield or Groombridge. I thought that one way of defining it might be to look at official records such as parish registers and the census but this doesn't actually help: it makes things more confusing!

The parish system developed gradually from about 950 to 1150. At the beginning of this period people living in Eridge went to church in Rotherfield. By the end, there was a church nearer to them in Frant. Parish registers (from 1538) listing baptisms, marriages and burials often give extra information such as a man's occupation and where they lived if it wasn't in the core village. Sadly the Frant parish clerk didn't seem to mind where people lived. There are a few exceptions: in 1544 Joan Humphrey of Eridge was buried at Frant, and in 1590 'Long Thomas' was buried. It would be interesting to know why his name was recorded like that. Two other burials were of people linked to the Nevills. In 1582 'William, a smith, and my Lord's man' died, and in 1598 'an old maide from Eridge Place'. At that date 'maid' would have meant spinster, though she must also have been a servant, and not a very important one since the clerk did not know her name. The handful of other entries are for people from Hamsell and Steelbridge.

Some people in Eridge preferred to go to Rotherfield church and were very occasionally listed as such in the register. In 1583 Elizabeth, daughter of John Crips of Eridge, was baptised at Rotherfield, and two children from Danegate were baptised in 1631 and 1643; Mary Weller and John Turner. By 1856 Eridge had its own church and parish. The first baptism on August 31st 1856 was of William Goddard Overy, son of Thomas Secker Overy, a farmer, and his wife Mary of Eridge. There were four other baptisms that year, one from Eridge, two from Rotherfield and

one from Speldhurst. The 1851 census shows that Thomas Overy was living at Hamsell Farm, which was classed as being in Rotherfield. Thomas was the son of the farmer, and baby William became a farm labourer. In future censuses he described himself as being born in Rotherfield.

Very few of the babies baptised in the new church in 1856 and 1857 can be found in the census for 1861, even though their place of residence in the register is given as Eridge Green, probably because Eridge was defined too narrowly by the census. In 1861 the enumerator described the area covered, from the 'Cottage at Eridge Green and taking in all the houses within 50 yards of the Turnpike Road' (the A26) and all the houses in the parish on the North West of the road including Eridge Village, Broadwater Forest and the High Rocks, with Sumner Vale, Strawberry Hill and Ramsly Farm House. This however, was very much for administrative purposes and does not necessarily tell us what made up Eridge. As we have seen, Hamsell, which we would probably include in Eridge, was part of Rotherfield for census purposes. Rare exceptions are Elizabeth and Henry James, children of Obed and Jane Farmer baptised on the same day in July 1857. By 1861 Obed was a widower, James was 7 and had been born in Uckfield and Elizabeth was 5 and was born in Frant, so they were not babes in arms when they were baptised. Obed was an agricultural labourer. Another exception is William, son of Job and Sarah Izard. Job was also an agricultural labourer - not surprising given that 75 agricultural labourers are listed as being employed by the Abergavenny family in the 1851 census! In 1861 most of the babies baptised were from Eridge, with two from Rotherfield.

The census shows that people moved around a lot, even if it was usually in a small area. The grocer of Eridge, John Killick came from Rotherfield and married a girl from Tunbridge Wells. Their children were born in Speldhurst, Ashurst and Frant. The youngest in the 1861 Census, Walter, was baptised in Eridge though his birth place was given as Frant. However, in 1871 John gave his own place of birth as Withyham and his wife and ten children were said to have been born in Frant! So much for trying to define Eridge through official records. -MaryAlexander



#### **Parish Past**

The Abergavenny Arms was for centuries known as "The Bull," which is the crest of the Nevill family - the name apparently upgraded to the present title with the Marquisate in the 1820's. Some of the timbers (rumoured to be old Elizabethan ship's timbers) reinforce the idea that a hostelry has existed here for at least 600 years and probably longer. It was known as a coaching inn in the 18th and early 19th centuries, a place where horses were changed and travellers could temporarily rest.

From earlier times the saloon bar was

used as a local Sessions area, ie where a panel of villagers judged local crimes and criminals - a forerunner of our jury system. According to testimony and research from the Rev Dudgeon (Rector in the 1920's) four men were condemned for sheep-stealing there in the 1560's and hanged from a yew tree on the corner of the Green, possibly somewhere near the present shop.

No subsequent death sentences are known but underneath the bar a cell is still preserved: such a narrow, confined space that any lengthy stay there would have been a punishment in itself. In the 19th

Century the Abergavenny was famous for hosting the annual Fawn and Beefsteak Pudding Supper, held around Christmas time, mainly but not entirely for employees on the Eridge Estate - which provided the fawn, while beer (and "baccy" for the smokers) was donated by a local brewery. A happier note on which to end!

Incidentally, The George seems to have been originally known as The Mercers Arms, the name changed sometime in the 18th Century in deference to one of the four royal Georges. The earliest recorded owner (he was probably too comfortably off to be the landlord) was Nicolas Hosmer in the 1640's, whose gravestone is the oldest surviving with an inscription in the churchyard: it gives his date of death as 1670. He seems to have traded as a mercer - that is a trader in better quality cloths, hence the pub name. A Hosmer ancestor, resident in Rotherfield, was burned at the stake as one of the Lewes protestant martyrs under "bloody" Queen Mary in 1556. -Pat Wright
