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From the Rectory



This past month has been a week of two opposites in our world and news.

As I write the Olympics are on and it is wonderful to see the world coming together in sport, where world conflicts and differences are set aside for the spectacle of individuals competing against each other.

Yet at the same time, this is the week of rioting across the UK, which perhaps was brewing for a long time, but sparked by the atrocity of children murdered in Southport. My wife and I happened to be there last month when visiting a vicar friend up there - such lovely friendly folk we met. It is a most chilling and terrible crime.

We have a week of coming together in peace at the Olympics, and yet also a week of division separation and appalling violence. What is our world coming to?

We seem more and more divided, globally and nationally at the very time when we are supposed to come together. This division seems to be everywhere, with French election results dividing, and the attempted assassination of Donald Trump.

Many seem to blame social media which is so often filled with insults and hatred. We have stopped trying to understand each other's problems, we have spurned wisdom, and turned to empty insults, devoid of argument and truth.

For myself I am sad that we have so often lost the foundation of our Christian values that our

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country was built on. We collectively know to "do to others as you would have them do to you" (as Jesus said) but we are not sure where that idea comes from or why that is so. Without the Christian foundation of belief those Christian values that we have assumed for so long, fade.

I worry that we have lost the sense of value that comes from knowing God made every person in his own image. The sense of truth being beyond oneself and our own opinions. The sense of ethics where the weak are cared for, the poor being looked after, showing hospitality to the stranger, and love for our enemies.

These are Christian values because they are the values of God himself. God who loved the world so much that he sent his one and only Son that whoever believes in him might not perish but have everlasting life.

In Jesus we see the reality of God's love for us, and the innate value of each person.

We live in a divided world in which people insult and talk past one another, where so many people no longer listen or try to understand and help each other. How I long for us to find in our creator God the commonality of our own shared humanity. How I long for all of us to find our deepest purpose and meaning, not in mere insults and agitations, but in the reality that we are all distinctively made for a reason, and that reason is found in God.

#### **Parish Council News**

The Parish Council doesn't meet in August as its normally a quiet month although not so quiet this year!

The Government has produced some new guidelines on their proposals for new planning guidelines which will impact all of us. It is a complex set of ideas which are geared to a significant



increase in house building in all but the most protected conservation areas ie The South Downs National Park. Where the Natural Landscape (also known as the AONB) fits into this is not entirely clear but there is clarity on the 'Green Belt' and how some of it can should be developed. The proposal is to create 'Grey areas' which can be developed and this will include some areas of currently 'Green Belt' land. I suspect how land moves from Green to Grey will be the subject of much discussion and debate and that has only just started!!

Some interesting work on the proposed Frant A267 pedestrian crossing regarding the difficult issue of lighting has now been done and looks very encouraging. Modern technology now means that upward light pollution can be minimised, and CMS/Smart City technology means that the lights will only operate at 20% of their capacity until triggered by movement. A similar lighting system is currently operating at the crossing recently put in at Upper Dicker.

Whilst most of us are on our holidays the day to day maintenance of the Parish continues. The posts have now been put on Frant Green to stop joy riders wrecking the cricket pitch and the village gates at Bells Yew Green and Little Bayham have been renovated. I am told that the dog bin for Frant, situated near the Church is imminent! I mentioned the very valuable work our volunteers do in maintaining and keeping our Village Halls operating in

the last edition.

The increasing expense of running them (especially Electricity) means that balancing the books is not easy despite

their best and valiant efforts. With some support from the Parish Council BYG Village Hall is still operational but does need more bookings so please don't hesitate to use it.

Very frustratingly still no news on Frant Village Shop. A much missed local amenity. Being a listed building any alterations need to be very carefully considered by conservation officers and planning officers alike and this takes time. Hopefully it wont be much longer before there is some progress to report. -Cllr Stuart Crookshank

#### **Frant Bowls Club**

By the time you read this Frant Bowls Club's Finals Day will have taken place. This is the culmination of several club competitions which have been played during the season. The objective is to win cups, prizes and, of course, the acclaim of the club membership.

The competitions that have been played were The Open which is basically a knockout series of matches, one against one. Another testing competition is the Two Wood. This is a singles match of sudden death. With only two bowls each it's vital to get your first bowl on target. Miss it and your opponent could have a distinct advantage. The other competition is the Drawn Pairs. With four bowls each and your partner having been selected at random, the match could be a lengthy one. The potential combination could be a novice player teamed up with a seasoned one.

However, just what has Frant Bowls Club been up to during 2024? Winning. Yes, it's true. Out of 19 matches, we've won 11 so far. That's pretty good considering that FBC has only 32 members of which 5 or 6 are non-playing supporters. Our matches can be against nearby Bayham & Lamberhurst or a little bit further away, for example, West Hoathly, Newick or Westfield. The clubs we play against do of course vary in size of membership. Some can have 70+ members or more and others can have as few as 20. But really whatever the

outcome everyone enjoys the matches and friendship of other clubs.

On a more domestic note we recently redecorated and refreshed our Club House. This was done during July by a small team of club members.

Earlier this year the Club renewed its ditch liners. We used to have some form of Astroturf which over the years became unwieldy and problematic to reinstall at the beginning of each season. Now, we have quality rubber linings which go along the base of the surrounding ditch. The rear walls of the ditches have been relined with a specialist material which prevents damage to bowls which sometimes go off the end of the green. Later in September we will have a Curry Lunch which is ably prepared and cooked by one of our members. This is a hugely enjoyable lunch and a good fund

raiser.

Our bowls season ends in September Many passers-by have remarked

and culminates in November when we have our Awards Evening. Again, this is a popular, social event and involves the presentation of cups and trophies to the worthy winners of our competitions. on the appearance and quality of our bowls green. Most of the general maintenance of the green is done by club members. However when it comes to the application of natural fertilisers and the elimination of rogue grasses and weeds we have the advice and guidance of a local bowls green expert.

#### **Frant Garden Club**

A summer spent in the garden is something to enjoy, especially if you are not the one who has to weed the beds and mow the lawns, which is why we always include garden visits in the annual programme.

This year our first trip, on a very rainy late May afternoon, was to Orchard Cottage at Boars Head. This is a garden that opens for the National Garden Scheme, and is owned and gardened by a confirmed "plantaholic" and her husband. The one and a half acre garden has a large variety of trees, shrubs, perennials and bulbs, and even on a miserable day was full of colour with hidden paths and secret areas to be discovered. The afternoon finished with tea and cake kindly served to over 20 of us in the owners' kitchen, and was testament to the fact that the English weather cannot deter us garden lovers!

In contrast our outing in July favoured us with a perfect summer's day for a trip to Belmont House and Garden near Faversham. Our guided tour explained that the house was designed by Samuel Wyatt, built in 1769 for local man, Edward Wilks, and, in later years was owned by the Harris family where is now houses the 5th Lord Harris's renowned clock collection, an armoury and a collection of Cazabon paintings. The present layout of the garden dates from the 1790's and consists of a walled garden, pinetum, formal lawns and a very large and immaculate kitchen garden. Lunch in the Conservatory for those that wanted it, and an airconditioned coach all added to a very enjoyable trip.

We have one final afternoon jaunt in September and then we are back in the Memorial Hall on Tuesday, 15th October at 2.30 p.m. for a talk by Caroline Halfpenny - The Gardens of Cornwall. The 2024 year ends for the Club on Tuesday, 19th November with our AGM and Christmas social.

#### **Eridge Arts Club**

On Wednesday 24 July Louis Ryan gave an interesting talk about the Spanish painter Diego Velasquez. Louis spoke from an artist's perspective, pointing out how Velasquez had been influenced by the other great artists of his day, notably Rubens, and at the behest of Philip IV had travelled to Italy to develop his art further. He showed how even the greatest artists made mistakes, sometimes with perspective, sometimes through overpainting; how, over time, paint can fade leading to pentimenti - the



appearance now of figures or other elements that Velasquez had originally painted out. He highlighted Velasquez's technique and, through a series of slides, illustrated his use of impasto, glazes and scumbles. At the end of the talk the audience expressed their great appreciation for a highly informative and engaging talk.

#### **The Arts Society Ashdown** Forest

» Thursday 12 September 2024 at 2.00pm: Impressionism and Post-Impressionism: an overview. Lecturer: Sarah Ciacci Crowborough Community Centre, Pine Grove, Crowborough, TN6 1FE

Impressionism and Post-Impressionism are two of the most popular art movements in the story of art, with famous Impressionists such as Monet, Renoir, Degas and Cezanne and a younger generation of Post-Impressionists including Seurat (pictured below), Gauguin and Van Gogh. Not only are their stories fascinating, their art diverse and

their ideas challenging, but a good understanding of these key artists helps explain many of the artistic changes that came after them.

Sarah Ciacci has an MA in History of Art specialising in late 19th century French Painting and 20th Century Art. She has been a blue badge guide for London since 2008. Byzantium played an important role as a link in the great chain of world history. With its roots in the Ancient World of Greece and Rome, the Byzantine period, AD 330 to 1453, spanned the medieval centuries. While much of the West was in deep decline, Byzantium, mistress of the Mediterranean and centre of Christendom, was a symbol of wealth, power and cultural ascendancy.

It was here in the eastern Mediterranean that Christianity took root and spread, giving us the architectural forms and imagery that are still part of the faith. We look at mosaics, frescoes and icons, opulent liturgical vessels in gold and enamel, silks,





ivories, manuscripts and the centrally planned domed churches, designed as microcosms of the Universe.

Jane is a freelance lecturer for the Arts Society and other arts organisations. She speaks several foreign languages and has translated a number of works of Russian literature for Penguin Books and the OUP. She created St James's Art Tours and ran it successfully for almost 25 years. She and her husband run an art gallery in St James's which specialises in 20th century art.
