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From the Rectory



We have come to that time of year when we have Remembrance Day. Over the years I have been aware that there has been a real change in how we remember. As I look back as a child in scouts I was regularly part of a big procession in my local town behind many veterans.

For my family it was an important time as my Grandparents were very much involved in their local veterans groups. My Nanna was in the WAAF and both my Grandads in the RAF. The war was in many ways the defining aspect of their life and when my Grandfather died he had his coffin draped with the RAF flag.

Today however there are so few veterans left. The Second World War came to an end 79 years ago. We read the names of the fallen in our churches, but now few will actually remember them.

It is hard I think to comprehend the sense of grief and loss our villages experienced through the First and Second World War. We read dozens of names, each one from a local family, I counted 63 from WW1 in our parish. The loss for individual villages like ours would have been devastating and you can see why people wanted to create the Memorial Hall in Frant in memory of loved ones.

What will we be remembering when there is no one left who remembers the men of our

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villages who died in war?

We are remembering their ultimate sacrifice. Jesus says "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13) then Jesus says "You are my friends." The divine Son of God laid down his life for us on the cross for our forgiveness and salvation.

The sacrifice of so many men in our villages speaks of the cost of the greatest love of all, to lay down one's life for a friend, and so we remember.

We also remember the 7193 British servicemen and women who died in war since World War Two.

To stop, remember and honour those who died in war speaks of our own values as people. To know that there is something of greater importance than even our own life. In our often selfish world, which is full of pride and self-achievement, their most humble of sacrifice reminds us that our greatest purpose is not found in selfish ambition but in following the way of Christ. To accept Christ's love and sacrifice for us, and so in turn love and serve others, even at great cost.

Join us for our Remembrance Sunday Service. I believe it is important also to encourage children to remember too, so families please feel welcome to join us, Frant 10:30am, Eridge 10:50am.

Our wonderful evenings of Music in Frant continue with world class music on our doorstep! Huge thanks to our loyal supporters and we encourage new members to come and experience one of our musical evenings in the months ahead.

Further to our greatly anticipated performance by the internationally renowned cellist Raphael Wallfisch on 25th October, our next concert will be on 17th January 2025 with the 2014 Young Musician of the Year pianist Martin James Bartlett (pictured below) performing. This promises to be a very special evening. Bartlett's early public success as the winner of the BBC Young Musician led to engagements with the BBC Symphony Orchestra, BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra and Ulster Orchestra and, in 2015, his BBC Proms debut performing Gershwin Rhapsody in Blue with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. For Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth's 90th Birthday, he performed at the National Service of Thanksgiving, which was broadcast live on BBC One

from St. Paul's Cathedral.

An exclusive recording artist with Warner Classics, Bartlett has released three widely acclaimed albums on the label. La Danse (2024) focuses on solo works by Couperin, Debussy, Hahn, Rameau and Ravel, and received 5-star reviews in The Times, as well as Editor's Choice on Gramophone. Rhapsody (2022), recorded with the London Philharmonic Orchestra and Joshua Weilerstein and featuring concerti by Rachmaninoff and Gershwin, was released to critical acclaim, also receiving Gramophone's Editor's Choice accolade and a 5-star review in BBC Music Magazine. His debut recital album Love and Death (2019) also received outstanding reviews in The Times, The Guardian and The Sunday Times. Frant Parish Friendship Group

The speaker for our first meeting after the summer break was Gilly Halcrow and her subject 'The Shetland Bus'. This was a fascinating talk about the brave Norwegian sailors, organised by the SOE, in their fishing boats who kept links open between occupied Norway and Britain during WWII, taking agents in with supplies for the resistance and escaping refugees out. Not only did they have to face sub-Arctic storms in the North Sea but also the might of the Nazi war machine out searching for them. First informally and then as a formal part of the war effort, the Shetland Bus operated more than 200 trips. Soldiers, intelligence personnel and military supplies were transported along with those fleeing capture.

Our exercise classes with Alison are going well and will continue through the winter months into May. New members are very welcome if you are interested but not sure if this is for you we do a taster session for £3.00 so why not come along and have a go. These sessions take place on the first and third Thursdays of the month in the Stables at 2.30 pm.

Parish Past The first mention of Eridge, so far traced, occurs in a list of lands left in 1296 by the Earl of Hereford that includes "Eregge, a grange pertaining to Rotherfield with 100 acres of land worth yearly 25/- ... heath and fern worth little also rents and

a watermill." This all later came into the ownership of Edward Nevill (vounger son of the Earl of Westmorland) through a fortunate marriage, although title was not proved for several years, eventually in 1450. The Nevills had actually been fortunate to survive the contemporary Wars of the Roses when six of them had been killed and at least one beheaded. During these wars, Edward was a Yorkist, and mostly absentee landlord and it seems to have been his grandson who first built a house - probably a cross between a hunting lodge and a farmhouse - "in a grange pertaining to Rotherfield a chace (ie a hunting area) containing 600 acres within which chace is a message called Eregge the greater part of which is heath worth only a halfpenny an acre."

However, a master forester and four



foresters were appointed there around 1470 and it is clear that extensive hunting and some itinerant occupation took place. A later group of foresters were accused of stealing peacocks in Rotherfield! Apart from them no permanent residents are noted but some certainly existed, the names Hamsell and Danegate being ancient and denoting some cleared and fenced pasture. Other groups were carrying on basic iron extraction in what then was still a widely wooded area as a document in 1573 gives permission for an enlarged, more modern works in the park providing it is on old foundations. Actually iron making did not survive long as the area became deforested to feed the furnaces. The Nevills remained largely caught up in battles and court affairs into the mid 16thC, enjoying or enduring various often dangerous fortunes - it was only from mid-century that both national and family fortunes settled somewhat and a cohesive village emerged. As a high point Elizabeth I was lavishly (and ruinously) entertained in a much enlarged Eridge Place in 1573. -Pat Wright

Parish Council News

Our recent Parish Council meeting reflected the increasing concerns at the volume and speed of traffic moving around our Parish. Residents from both Frant and Bells Yew Green expressed their worries and real fears that a serious accident is bound to happen sooner rather than later.

Unfortunately, the ultimate responsibility for the roads, lineage, speed etc lies with East Sussex County Council not us but that doesn't mean to say that the Parish Council can do nothing. We hold a 6 monthly meeting with representatives of East Sussex Highways and their contractor Balfour Beatty. These meetings are useful in getting some things done-Lines repainted, signs put up, drains cleared etc but they do not address the speeding issue. The Parish Council, is as you know at quite an advanced stage in commissioning and paying for a pedestrian crossing on the A267 Frant Road which we all hope will not only make crossing the road safer but also act as a significant traffic calming measure for the whole of Frant village. We also commission and pay for traffic speeding surveys which are the very early stages of trying to address the speeding issue but in truth the process from the survey to actually getting something done is a long and tortuous one, taking many years.

That's not to say we won't try but slowing traffic down is not just about speed limits and all initiatives need to be looked at and evaluated which of course takes time. The chicanes in Bells Yew Green took 5 years of negotiation but we got there in the end and the Pedestrian crossing has so far taken 8 years and hopefully will be completed next year.

The Parish Council has written to the owners of the shop in Frant Village to seek a meeting to try and move things on. We have also spoken to Wealden District Council expressing our concerns at the length of time it is taking to resolve the issues around the shop which is so important to the community and is sorely missed. It is, of course, a Grade 2 listed building so inevitably any modifications will require careful consideration by the planners.

Speaking of planners I understand that the developers involved in the proposed large development around the Tunbridge Wells Rugby Club and its move to a site off Bunny Lane and

the building of some 350 houses will be having an open day for all to see the proposed plans at the Rugby club in the next few weeks.

Worth a visit I'd have thought.

Eridge Arts Club Event

Gavin Barker, head of a leading boutique talent agency (and Eridge resident), entertained the Eridge Arts Club with a fascinating 'behind the scenes' account of his experiences as a talent agent. We learned that many talent agents had been performers first - Gavin had been a dancer for five years before spending the next 30 years as a talent agent. One part of the role was attending the drama schools' annual showcasing events where the agencies competed with each other to secure the most promising talent.

Another part was nurturing actors, dancers and entertainers, helping them to obtain opportunities and negotiating terms and fees on their behalf. (Negotiations could be a cat and mouse game, with negotiations lasting several weeks). Whilst a few of us had

some awareness of talent agents through the successful French television series, 'Call my Agent', it was illuminating to learn about casting directors who had an all-important role in finding actors for directors to audition. The rapport between leading actors would be critical and a 'chemistry test' essential to determine if the central relationships in a show would be convincing. The final say in casting would be the producer who was financing the production. It was clear from Gavin's talk how committed and supportive he is towards the entertainers he represents. The audience was full of questions about Gavin's fascinating career and thanked him for a very entertaining evening.

The next talk at the Eridge Arts Club will be 'Beneath the Surface: a New Look at Cezanne's painting "The Eternal Feminine" (pictured below), a talk by Ambrose Cicutti, recent Warburg and Courtauld Institute alumnus.

News from Nus Ghani MP

Remembrance brings us together in recognition of all who have served and made the ultimate sacrifice on behalf of our country, defending the freedoms and values of our great nation and protecting our way of life.

The annual act of remembrance on Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday binds us and the rest of the nation together in a sobering moment of reflection. As I join our communities every year on Remembrance Sunday to pay respects to our Armed Forces past and present, it is always an honour to stand with local veterans and meet those who serve our country at home or abroad today. I will also plant a remembrance cross in the Remembrance Garden at the Houses of Parliament, to represent the many fallen men and women from our constituency of Sussex Weald.

Our British Armed Forces are the ultimate defenders of our security and freedom. They are respected the world over and we depend on them to keep us safe at home and abroad. It is important that we also support our current military personnel, and I will continue to campaign for the recognition, care, and post-service security that they deserve.

This year, we will also continue thinking of our friends and allies in Ukraine and the brave soldiers as they continue to defend their country's sovereignty against Russian aggression and fight for freedom. But while Putin's illegal war continues, the rebuilding work is already underway. As Minister of State at the Department of Business and Trade and Minister for Europe at the Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office, I oversaw the UK's role in Ukraine reconstruction, cochaired the UK-Ukraine Infrastructure Taskforce and hosted the Ukraine Recovery Conference, which brought together thousands of representatives from public and private sectors to commit support to Ukraine's recovery and accelerate restoring its key services.

I continue supporting Ukrainian families living in Sussex Weald, but I know from my many meetings and correspondence with them that what they want most is to return home safely and reunite with their loved ones. The UK's support for Ukraine must remain steadfast so that our efforts to help with the rebuilding of Ukraine will enable them to do just that.
