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From the Rectory



I turned 40 a few months ago, and I was reflecting the other day the way in which our society and culture has changed over the years.

When I was growing up, our culture it seems to me was quite a modernist one. Truth was generally seen as universal, and facts were known primarily through the exploration of science. There were lots of prominent atheists who pitted Christianity against atheism like Richard Dawkins and Christopher Hitchings they proposed a world known almost exclusively through the prism of science. Yet that modernist view failed. It couldn't account for morality, and it didn't provide the answers we needed for living in our ever-changing and diverse world.

As time went on and we tried to live in a pluralised society we went into a kind of postmodernism. Our friends and neighbours believed very different things, and that was ok, but then people would say "I have my truth, and you have your truth" as if completely opposing ideas can both be true. Postmodernism left behind the idea of universal truth and facts.

Now though postmodernism has failed. Particularly since covid, it seems there has been an exponential rise of conspiracy theories, which can only be combated by actual truth. I saw a BBC advert come up on my social media the other week, which showed a fake AI video of the Eifel Tower on fire and said, "disinformation

distorts reality," "The fight for Truth is On," "Trust is Earned," "This is our BBC."

What you believe matters, and it matters whether something is actually true or not. Every day since President Trump's inauguration, the top of the news has been the latest globe affecting Executive Order he had signed that day. Some people hail Trump as a genius who is fighting for them, others think he is crazy and messing up the whole world - what everyone seems to now agree with though is the truth of it actually matters!

Where can you find truth? How can you know it? How do you know what is right and wrong? How can you know what is reality and what isn't?

This year at church we are celebrating a Year of Faith – it is the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene creed when in the year 325AD, 220 Bishops across the known world got together and universally acknowledged the foundational truth which the Bible teaches and wrote it down. Every Christian church in history since then has held to that creed as truth. Truth is not found merely in science, or opinions - as a Christian I believe that universal truth is essential, and that Truth has been revealed by God through Jesus. Join us as we unpack what that means for our lives today.

Parish Council News

Always good at this time of year to be in receipt of positive news and it happens every year!

Each year the Parish Council receives £2,000 as a bequest to the Community from the Henry Smith foundation.

Who he I hear you say? He was apparently a 16th Century Philanthropist who made a fortune in salt amongst other things. The subsequent Trustees of his estate have developed a huge portfolio of landholdings and investments and in 2018 gave away £27 million pounds alone. Henry Smith wanted the poor of Sussex, some of his staff came from Sussex to benefit from his legacy and thus we receive this donation. About 7 years ago the Parish Council decided to use this money, following the closure of Frant surgery, to fund a taxi service to enable the

elderly/infirm residents of the Parish to access medical/dental care. One of our Councillors-Andrew Macdonald-Brown runs this for us and if anyone requires use of this facility, please get in touch with him on 891273 to become a member of the Dial to Drive service. It is free to use and all we ask for is a retainer of $\pounds 20$. On the not quite sure whether its positive news or not front there are apparently changes afoot in how we are

about to be governed.

The Government is launching its English Devolution White Paper. For us this means that East Sussex County Council, West Sussex County Council and Brighton and Hove City Council may merge into a Unitary body under an elected Mayor if it were to go ahead. The timeframe for this is within the next 2 years! District and Borough Councils will cease to exist but there doesn't as yet seem to be mention of Parish Councils. The purpose of this proposed major restructuring is to give the local people more of a voice apparently and provide significant economies of scale. Interestingly one of the functions destined for the Mayor's Office is I



believe planning! The consultation process will be starting imminently so we should know more soon hopefully.

Talking of planning the proposed move of Tunbridge Wells Rugby Club to a site off Bunny Lane and the building of 450 + houses is continuing to generate local concerns particularly from Tunbridge Wells residents who have set up an action group to challenge the proposals. They have attended the Parish Council meetings a couple of times and are doing some major research into the many reasons why this development should not go ahead. They can be contacted on 07557 475533 if anyone would like to offer them their support.

To finish with a flourish and a note of positivity Frant Green has been identified by an independent body as potentially one of the best managed greens for wildlife in East Sussex. More on this later but excellent that it appears that the good work of Frant residents, Parish Councillors and Contractors is not only succeeding but about to be acknowledged.

Our 2024 meetings gave us an opportunity to hear talks on a variety of subjects, including Sue Marshall's love affair with the iris, Clive Nuttman explaining the importance of insects and tiny creatures that inhabit our planet and which are so essential for its survival, and Caroline Halfpenny's whistle stop tour of the gardens of Cornwall, reminding us of the beauty of this island of ours. With enthusiastic support for our outings from members old and new, we ended the year on a high.

By the time you read this the Club will have held it's annual lunch at The George, and will be looking forward to the first talk of the year on Tuesday, 25th March which, I am delighted to say, will be a return of Morag from Rapkyns Nursery. This is always a wonderful opportunity for members to buy plants from her as well as gain her advice and encouragement at the beginning of another gardening year.

On Tuesday, 29th April, Anna Ribo, a

local gardening expert, will give a talk that will explore ways of gardening that respects and enhances wildlife while leaving space for the keen gardener. Our summer events will include an afternoon outing in early June to "Hollymount", a private garden at High Hurstwood consisting of 7 acres of beautiful garden centred around water, with the added attraction of pigs, alpacas, chickens and ducks, and then in September a trip to Charles Darwin's Down House. Parish Past

As you drive towards Mark Cross, have you ever wondered who or what the sign Pococksgate remembers? Actually it's the family Pocock who lived and farmed around there for around 200 years and probably much longer.

The first of that name of which there is any record is Robert, who was appointed beadle by the Manor Court in 1524, he later became clerk to the Court as well. A beadle was the local enforcer of customs and law, therefore often unpopular, but clearly to reach these positions the family was already long established in the parish and at Robert's death in 1543 he was able to leave 20 acres freely to his son, plus other rented land. The family continued to grow and extend their holding, possibly at their neighbours expense since we find Laurence Clark sentenced in 1601 for "casting stones and roots onto Richard Pocock's ditch" for which he was fined 5/-, later increased to 20/- for non payment. The ditch is likely to have marked a much resented encroachment into Clark's land. Bad feeling continued and not long after we find Alexander Pocock in trouble for "fisticuffs," but in the next generation the family's fortunes began to declne and a later Richard is selling land to the Clarks for no less than £21, a considerable sum for the time and denoting a good sized holding. The money was to be kept in trust for his children by the vicar, which suggests that for some reason Richard was incapable by that time: he died only a few years later in 1605.

The last mention of the Pococks is another Robert, who died in in 1634, still possessed of some land, so probably the family continued in the area for some while. Interestingly the name Pocock derived in medieval times from a nickname (as many modern names do). It refers to a peacock or as we would say, popinjay, but we have no means of knowing which distant ancestor incurred this slightly derogatory moniker by over-flaunting their looks or accomplishments, but can maybe imagine some covert chuckles about the (perhaps) oppressive beadle' name in the 1530's. -Pat Wright



Our BYG Village Hall Clock

Our Smith's timepiece is an early Sectric clock that hasn't been working for a couple of years. Although it has an ordinary looking face, it was sufficiently modern at the time to be presented to the Hall by BYG residents on the occasion of the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II in 1953. By chance I discovered a friend was an amateur horologist in Wadhurst who 'operated' on the bakelite casing and removed, disassembled, cleaned and oiled the very dirty mechanism. It has now been fully reassembled and restored to its rightful place and will give you an accurate time, when you next have occasion to hire/visit the hall!

London, New York, St Ives: the Avant Garde in Cornwall, 1939-1964'. Lecturer Sarah Burles

The arrival of Ben Nicholson (pictured right), Barbara Hepworth and Naum Gabo in St Ives at the beginning of the Second World War marked a significant moment, both for them and the artists already living and working in the small Cornish town.

These three artists were key players in British modernism and soon challenged the status quo of the existing artists' colony, established at the end of the 19th century. They inspired and, in Hepworth's case employed, a younger generation of artists before they too were challenged by new ideas.

This lecture will chart the rise of St Ives as a centre for modern art after the war and show that it was not only Nicholson, Hepworth and Gabo who achieved international success, but other artists including Peter Lanyon, Roger Hilton, Terry Frost and Wilhemena Barns Graham.

Their successes meant that the town became a focal point for post-war avant garde art, which led the eyes of the modern art world to focus, for a brief period, on St Ives.

'Riviera Paradise: Art, Design and Pleasure in the 1920s' Lecturer Mary Alexander Since the C19th, English high society had 'wintered over' on the Cote d'Azur, but always left by April. In the 1920s however an intoxicating mix of artists, writers, musicians and international visitors created a new summer season.

Suntans and sportswear soon became de rigeur in the chic new coastal resorts, villas and hotels. A liberating playground of ideas across the visual design arts was stimulated by impressarios Serge Diaghilev and Paul Poiret. Traditional boundaries were torn down. Matisse. Picasso, Dufy (pictured right), Cocteau and Chanel merged the worlds of fashion, theatre and interiors. Cole Porter and Scott Fitzgerald introduced an American perspective and attracted an influential new set of discerning patrons and collectors. We will 'time travel' to meet them all.

Another term has flown by and we are half way through the year!

Our Forest School learning has continued with the brilliant Mrs Fox. We have now seen Reception, Year 1 and now Year 2 through their Forest School journey this academic year. The children have loved every minute especially getting so muddy!

We were very lucky to have Katharine Jennings, local artist from Rotherfield to come and work with both staff and pupils to create an amazing piece based on the Frant logo. Each child created a piece based on their hopes and dreams for the year 2025. Once each piece was created it revealed the Frant school logo which is now on display in our school hall for all to see.

We have been taking part in our big Food Waste Challenge, working against 6 other schools to see if we can be the school to throw away the least amount of food waste. We have appointed 'food waste heroes', who have been weighing our waste each day, recording the results, creating a weekly average and comparing our weight to different animals. We will find out in Term 4 how we have done.

We held our first charity event for our chosen charity, working with the school in Nkuringo, Africa, where we sponsor a 9 year old boy, Leonari. News from Nus Ghani MP

I'm always keen to ensure that our democracy and Parliament is as open as possible, which is why I have welcomed hundreds of Sussex Weald constituents, local teachers and students, charity volunteers and businesses to Westminster over the past ten years. There are several ways you can take





advantage of the unique experience of exploring the beating heart of our democracy, and as your MP, I would be happy to assist you in arranging a visit free of charge. Please note that I am only able to assist with the booking of the tour itself and all travel to Parliament must be covered by visitors themselves separately.

Palace of Westminster Tours: With the help of a tour guide, you can explore the House of Commons, House of Lords and Westminster Hall, where Parliament first sat. You will also get to see the Speaker's Chair, the famous green benches, the lobbies where votes take place, the Royal Throne in the House of Lords chamber, The King's Robing Room and other iconic spaces in this world-famous building. Tours last approximately 75 minutes and take place on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday mornings and Friday afternoons when Parliament is sitting.

Elizabeth Tower (Big Ben) Tours: MPs only have a yearly allocation of eight tickets each to distribute to constituents free of charge, so you may be added to a waiting list. If you would rather book and pay for your own tickets, they are released to the general public to purchase on the second Wednesday of each month at £30 per adult. Big Ben tours run from Monday to Saturday, last approximately 1 hour 45 minutes, and you will be at the belfry for the o'clock bongs.

Prime Minister's Questions (PMQs) tickets: Why not watch the most iconic Parliamentary event right from the public gallery? Taking place every Wednesday at noon, this 40-minute session is very popular and due to limited tickets, there is a (up to several months long) waiting list. However, if you register your interest, I will contact you when tickets become available.

It is an honour and privilege to represent Sussex Weald in Parliament and in the Chair as Madam Deputy Speaker. I am always delighted to welcome local residents to Parliament for a first-hand experience of our democracy.
