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When I arrived at the rectory in Frant nearly six years ago I soon realised part of the garden was an old vegetable patch - you can see it at the front of the picture above, behind the gate.

One of the previous Rectors clearly had green fingers, you could see lots of evidence of this previously very well-tended area with a neat little fence and gate.

When I arrived, the patch had been neglected over the years and you couldn't see the old fences (that had fallen down) and the old gate due to all the nettles.

It was tremendously exciting (with help from some willing volunteers) when we first got here to cut back the overgrown weeds and find gooseberry bushes, blackcurrant bushes, tayberries, raspberries and blackberries.

Clearly the area had been very productive. So, with the inspiration of previous generation planting, we build up our own vegetable patch, reinstalled the gate in the picture, and put up chicken wire to keep the rabbits out (which we love to watch in the garden - just not when they eat our food!).

I have never however really had enough time or effort to hold back the tidal waves of old weeds from taking over - every year was a battle bravely fought but ultimately lost, and the patch ended up looking like a wild garden.

So this year we'd had enough, and we bought raised beds, with weed membrane underneath and new compost - in the hope of growing less, but doing it better!

So far caring for and prioritising a smaller manageable area is working, and it occurred to me

that might say something about our lives too...

I think often we feel overwhelmed by the constant business of our lives, like fighting back the weeds, we are fighting for time here and there to do what we truly think is important. My perception is we are busier than we have ever been, but are we happier?

Mostly, I see stressed people in the busyness of life, trying to do too much. But if you sit back and think what is actually most important, would that change your priorities and efforts? Would it be better to do fewer things well, than manically run around trying to sort and solve everything?

As a Christian this is particularly important to me. I don't want to waste my life, I don't want to miss the important moments of my children's life, I want to serve God and our community well. In order to do that perhaps I need to focus my life like I focus my vegetable patch... that I might grow and mature well as a person in life, bearing good fruit.

Jesus said in Matthew 6 that we shouldn't worry about this or that, food, clothing, life, but rather seek the Kingdom of God. Perhaps I should have four main raised beds of my life to focus on in my own growth - growing for God, growing for family and friends, growing in work, growing in volunteering or hobbies. What in particular should I put into each of those raised beds?

How you grow this year as a person is important, and I would love to encourage you with us to put God at the centre of your life and growth as a person. At church we want to equip and inspire each of us to grow together and make those positive choices for life and we would love you to grow with us. -Rev Brendan Martin

### **Frant Bowls Club**

» Launching the 2025 Season By the time you read this Frant Bowls Club will have started its 2025 Season. Part of the preparation for the season was the Spring Tidy-Up which is always the first action we have following the club's hibernation throughout the winter.

Despite the bowls green having been put to bed' over the winter, bowls green maintenance still needs to be done. Our green is cut, weather permitting, throughout the closed season. Moreover as the green is used two or three times a week from April to September, the grass does get a bit tired. Therefore top dressing and reseeding is required. One or two of our members had the strength and stamina to roll the green during March. Although moles are not a problem a few peaks and troughs do develop during the season and need to be 'ironed' out.

The green always looks good but we have to be alert to the green-keepers' enemies such as fusarium, pearlwort and to a lesser extent worm casts. In the main these problems are dealt with by an outside contractor who would use environmentally friendly applications to control these invaders. However you will see members on the green before a match and grass cutting giving the surface a good switching to remove the worm casts which are thrown by the worms. The worms are gently persuaded to leave the green but they soon return.

Anyway, back to the Spring Tidyup, we do this every year at the start of the season. This involves cleaning our splendid club house, putting out the benches, mowing the surrounds and clearing out the ditches which tend to clog up with leaves during the winter. Then we reinstall the 'Hedgehog' mats in the ditches. These are rectangular mats

that we put in the ditches around the green to prevent damage to our bowls which sometimes go off the end of a rink either through tactics or just being too heavy handed.

As usual the Spring Tidy-up was well supported by our club members who brought along some their own gardening kit such as hoes, leaf blowers, shears and pressure washers to augment the bowls club's assortment of tools. The photograph shows what a happy bunch we are.

Refreshments during this clean up session are always welcome halfway through the morning. During the tea break there's chat about the coming fixtures and the club competitions which have already been drawn. Our first fixture was at Ringmer which was a good opportunity to renew old friendships and get back into the rhythm of lawn bowls. Finished by mid-day, we gave ourselves a pat on the back and looked forward to our first roll-up which was on 15th April followed by a BBQ.

Lawn bowls is a fascinating game of strategy. Whilst the objective is to deliver your bowls accurately and place them nearest the small white ball, the Jack, it can involve blocking your opponent and even pushing the opponent's bowls out of the way. Ultimately though bowls is a easy going, good humoured outdoor game.

#### **Parish Past**

It will probably come as a surprise to realise that many millions of years ago Frant lay at the bottom of an ocean that stretched from near modern London and deep into France. But, gradually, seismic pressures began to lift the land, swamps and deltas formed where dinosaurs roamed amid sandbanks, reeds and silt. More clay was deposited and the land sank under its weight until Frant again lav deep under water.

As it sank, shells and the remains of sea creatures began to form chalk, sealing in the mud, which in turn helped clear the water so even more sea life could thrive, adding to the chalk as they died. More millions of years, and upward pressure began again, shoving the chalk above the surface, cracking it too and making it more vulnerable to erosion.

So ... what we have now is Wealden clay soil in your garden which was long ago

deposited by that ancient ocean, and the North and South Downs which are the remaining uneroded edges of that chalk dome of long dead sea creatures. Difficult to get one's head around? Yes, but when thirty or so years ago a company drilled for oil near Ticehurst what they found in their clay cores from hundreds of feet deep were the unmistakable fossils of sea creatures and shells - unfortunately not oil in commercial quantities. -Pat Wright

#### » Saturday 10th May, 05.00-07.30 Dawn Chorus Wildlife Walk

Get up very early and be rewarded by the wonders of the dawn chorus. Learn to identify the different melodies and calls of birds as they warm up their vocal chords. Our experts will help you distinguish between a melodious blackbird, a rather intense wren, a newly-arrived warbler and perhaps the beautiful song of the woodlark. If you're really lucky you might hear the scratchy song of the Dartford warbler, a bird that only started breeding at Broadwater in 2022.

#### » Friday 13th June, 20.30-22.30 **Broadwater at Dusk**

Join us on a guided walk to the best spots to see and hear nightjar. On the way we'll be looking out for the wildlife that comes to life as the sun goes down. We'll listen out for roving woodcock and then see the nightjars performing their fascinating churring and wing-clapping displays. On our way back to the car park we'll look for the bright green lights of glowworms at the sides of the tracks.



#### **Fungus Identification Walk**

Join nationally-recognised fungus expert Martin Allison on a hunt for the reserve's hidden gems. Martin will help you tell the difference between chantarelles, parasols, puffballs, deceivers, ceps and blewits. #### News from Nus Ghani, MP

This month, we come together to commemorate the 80th Anniversary of Victory in Europe Day and pay our respects to those who fought in the Second World War. A series of events will take place locally in Sussex Weald and across the United Kingdom to mark this momentous occasion in our country's history and bind us together in a moment of reflection, celebration and remembrance of those who served and sacrificed defending the values of our great nation.

Our British Armed Forces are the ultimate defenders of our security and freedom. They are respected the world over and I always convey our gratitude when spending time with local residents whose family members worked with our Armed Forces overseas. I'm proud to have been working with the local branches of the Royal British Legion for many years and it is always an honour to stand with local veterans on Remembrance Sunday and meet those who serve our country at home or abroad today. Given the county's proximity to Europe, East Sussex has often been on the front line of war. As a result, many of our towns and villages across Sussex Weald have had a long connection to the military.

To highlight a few of those local connections, Horam was home to a former RAF Squadron Leader and WWII Spitfire pilot Jack Hemmings, who sadly died at the age of 103 earlier this year. In Crowborough, we have a memorial dedicated to soldiers of The Lincoln and Welland Regiment from Canada, who were killed when a V1 bomb struck their encampment.

Similarly, Wadhurst was a home to William Broughton Gingell, a pilot from the Photographic Reconnaissance Units, which was an unarmed and unprotected unit taking photographs of strategically important sites which were then analysed for intelligence and used in strategic planning. Moreover, I am pleased to be supporting a new permanent memorial for Flying Officer Percy Burton in Hailsham, to mark the spot where his plane tragically crashed during the Battle of Britain.

Throughout the weekend and the week leading up to VE Day, many of our towns and villages including Hailsham, Crowborough, Heathfield, Wadhurst and Rotherfield will be lighting beacons and hosting a programme of events for our communities and families to bring the commemorations to life.

We shall never forget the bravery and sacrifices of those who fought for our country and our freedoms. I hope local residents of all ages will take the opportunity to reflect on and mark this important anniversary in our history, and I look forward to joining our communities at celebrations across Sussex Weald.

#### **Eridge Arts Club** » Franz Liszt: an Eridge Arts talk by St John Brown at 7.30pm on Wednesday, 14 May in Eridge Village Hall.

The next Eridge Arts Club event will be a talk by St John Brown about the influential Romantic composer, Franz Liszt (pictured above). The talk will be on Wednesday, 14 May at 7.30pm in the Eridge Village Hall.

Liszt is recognised as one of the most brilliant musicians of the 19th Century. He significantly expanded the boundaries of both piano playing and what was possible on the piano, and his

compositions were a major influence on later composers. More busts were made of Liszt in the 19th century than anyone else - except Napoleon ! He was arguably the first international celebrity. He entered Holy Orders late in life, and was extremely generous to other composers and pianists. Our speaker, St John Brown, who hosted a local radio classical music programme for five years, will talk about the life and music of this extraordinary musician. Tickets are £5 on the door. #### Frant and the Bayham Riot 1525 Bayham seems an unlikely place for a riot but on Whitsunday June 4th 1525 over a hundred armed men with painted faces (to avoid being recognised) arrived at the Abbey. Some of these men came from Frant, and perhaps some were from Eridge. Bayham Abbey is in the parish of Frant though the rest of Bayham is in Kent. The men were angry because the Abbey had been closed down by Cardinal Wolsey, Henry VIII's minister, along with eighteen others in England, so he could found a new college in Oxford, now called Christ Church. The rioters returned the canons and installed a new abbot. The rebellion lasted for eight days without any sign of government action. It may be that after the Whitsun Week holiday was over the rioters simply went home thinking they had done their job, but the canons were soon evicted again, permanently.

The riot was extremely unusual in the closing of monasteries and no-one knows quite why it happened. By the 16th century the monastic life was declining but the locals were clearly very attached to Bayham Abbey, and there had been no bad reports about it. It was part of the Premonstratensian Order of canons, who were priests living a monastic life. It would have had an important place in local life not only spiritually but in the employment it gave to farm labourers and local tradesmen. The canons had more freedom than monks and local villagers would have known them personally. The closure of Bayham Abbey may have been a last straw for local people after much heavy taxation by Wolsey. The lack of force to end the riot is also strange, but the Weald was inaccessible and the people known to be unruly and anyway there was no police force or standing army. Lord Abergavenny was the obvious person to put down the disturbance but it seems that he too may have been involved or at least supported the action. For example, William Roots, the rector of Buxted, had been Abergavenny's chaplain, and the newly installed 'abbot' Thomas Towers, had spent a year with Roots before going to Bayham. Also, two of Abergavenny's servants are said to have encouraged men to join in. Wolsey was Abergavenny's enemy and had caused him a great deal of trouble. Henry Darell of Scotney Castle kept Wolsey informed but took no action.

Afterwards twenty-seven men were indicted for the offence. The ring leaders were imprisoned. At its height there were said to be two hundred men involved and they claimed they had support from Bayham to Bramber. Nearly all of the twenty-seven came from Brenchley, Frant, Lamberhurst or Wadhurst: all close to Bayham, but many other places in Sussex and Kent were mentioned in reports. William Gale, the real abbot, was indicted but as he had been temporarily replaced in the riot presumably he did not agree with it. He was moved to be abbot of another less important abbey, but no provision was made for the other canons. This would have been a major source of unhappiness for them, and perhaps a source of anger to the rioters. The men from Frant were John Grangeman, a farm labourer, Thomas Mills, another farm labourer, William Mepham, a weaver, John Mower, a servingman, Robert Porter was described as a chaplain, and Robert Reynard was a husbandman, or farmer. Men from elsewhere included a brewer, shearman, tailor, smith and cordwainer. The rioters were a mixture of working men and tradesman. Robert Porter is interesting. He may have been one of the canons, or possibly a chaplain to a local gentleman. Scarcely a generation later John Porter of Bayham was having children christened at Frant from 1557. Might Robert have stayed on after the dissolution of Bayham, perhaps as a bailiff for the Abbey lands, and married and had children?

It is refreshing to read about a riot with no bloodshed or damage, apparently,



although the men were armed with longbows, cross-bows, swords and clubs. They told the canons that if there was any more trouble they had only to ring the bell and help would come. It must have been a terrible shock to have such a local institution closed down suddenly for no good reason. Eleven years later every monastery would suffer the same fate. Bayham is now a lovely, peaceful place but before 1525 it would have been very busy, lively place that seemed to be a permanent part of the landscape and

local life.
